

## **INTRODUCTION**

I am pleased to report 2009 was a successful year for the Beachwood Police Department. We are working hard to continue to improve our ability to provide the City of Beachwood with quality law enforcement services. Our long term focus on organizational competence has not lapsed and we are dedicated to continuing to look for ways to affirmatively promote a feeling of safety and security to the citizens, visitors, and businesses in the City of Beachwood.

The Commission of Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies will visit the police department April 24, 2010 through April 27, 2010. During that visit, the assessors will evaluate our department for compliance with the 464 accreditation standards required to maintain the status of the Beachwood Police Department as an Accredited Law Enforcement Agency. The entire department has worked diligently over the past three years, and I am confident in our ability to document to the assessors that the Beachwood Police Department is worthy of a second award as an accredited agency.

At the time of this writing, final statistics are not in but the Beachwood Police Department, with the help of JEM consulting, developed an aggressive recruiting plan to increase the diversity of the patrol division. This plan was carried out and it is our hope that these documented efforts will see an increase in minority applicants for our upcoming entrance exam.

Our command staff has studied our future manpower needs, and an entrance examination will be given March 11, 2010 to establish a list of qualified candidates. While we were fully staffed for the year 2009, we anticipate a significant number of retirements will take place late 2010 through 2011. Having this eligibility list certified in advance will leave us in a good position to fill the vacancies as they occur. Similarly, a promotional examination is anticipated Fall of 2010 to fill the vacancies created by retiring command staff.

All components of our department are functioning at or beyond an acceptable level. We greatly appreciate the support of Mayor Merle S. Gorden, Beachwood City Council, and the entire City Hall Staff. It is with that support that we are able to make satisfactory progress towards achieving our long term goals.

# **ACCREDITATION REPORT**



In 2009, the Beachwood Police Department continued the work to retain our accredited status through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (C.A.L.E.A.). C.A.L.E.A., an international organization comprised of law enforcement officials and professionals, has designated a list of over four-hundred fifty standards that they recommend be followed by law enforcement agencies. The standards are constantly reviewed by the commission and are considered the best professional practices for law enforcement.

A successful reaccreditation is contingent upon the department's ability to demonstrate continued compliance to applicable standards during the period being reviewed. The year was spent tracking the department's performance, identifying changes to procedures, and ensuring that periodic analyses, reviews, and other mandated activities were accomplished during our reaccreditation period.

During 2009, new policies were released and existing policies were revised. Most of these revisions were due to modifications to C.A.L.E.A. standards or changes in our procedures.

Throughout the year, the accreditation manager assisted Mentor-on-the-Lake Police Department, Highland Heights Police Department, and The Cleveland Clinic Police Department with their mock assessments. This proved to be beneficial for our department as well as it provided the opportunity to sit with other accreditation managers and/or assessors and discuss the best options for proving and documenting compliance with C.A.L.E.A. standards.

In July, the accreditation manager attended a conference in Hampton, Virginia. The annual conferences offer informative workshops and provide a means to speak with other law enforcement agencies on various accreditation related topics. At this conference, we were able to identify assessors who were able to assist with our mock assessment.

In October, the department had its mock assessment to prepare for the actual C.A.L.E.A. assessment in April of 2010. During the two and a half day mock assessment, accreditation managers from other departments volunteered their time to review the files that had been compiled and offered numerous suggestions for proving compliance. Two of the accreditation managers were actual C.A.L.E.A. assessors as well and their feedback was most helpful.

The accreditation process has resulted in many improvements to the department. Stricter evidence control, regular inspections of the operations and equipment, thorough recruitment of police personnel and streamlined promotional and hiring processes are just a few of the enhancements the department has seen as a result of becoming accredited. After several years

of working under C.A.L.E.A. guidelines, accreditation has proved to be beneficial to the Beachwood Police Department. As part of the process, the department's policies and procedures have been updated with the goal of not only complying with C.A.L.E.A. standards, but to improve all aspects of the police department and most importantly, the service it delivers to the citizens of Beachwood. The progress that has been made through this process and the attainment of an accredited status is a direct reflection on the dedication and professionalism of all members of the Beachwood Police Department.

## **TECHNOLOGY REPORT**

In 2009, the Police Department assisted the Fire Department with their new MDT System upgrade, which included added functionality and enhancements, including GPS functionality. Their system was also designed for digital video with live streaming capabilities, and auto uploading of recorded video for later add-on.

In 2009, a Technical Security Audit on the Police Network was performed by the Ohio Law Enforcement Automated Data Systems (LEADS) as a part of their bi-annual security audit program. The Beachwood Police Department was found to have NO violations or concerns by the auditor.

### **AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR (AED) PROGRAM**

The Beachwood Police Department's Automated External Defibrillator program (AED) continues to provide the community with constant deployment of first responder cardiac care. All police units on patrol are equipped with an AED unit. Beachwood police officers that arrive to a medical emergency involving a person who has suffered sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) are able to deploy immediate cardiac care with an AED. Sudden cardiac arrest is a condition in which the heart is in a rhythm pattern of ventricular fibrillation or ventricular tachycardia. These heart rhythms can not sustain life and only immediate defibrillation can convert such a heart rhythm.

A person who is a victim of SCA requires immediate defibrillation. CPR alone will not save a victim of SCA, although CPR may extend the window of time within which the AED is effective. For every minute from the onset of sudden cardiac arrest that the victim does not receive immediate defibrillation, the survival rate drops by approximately 10%. If such defibrillation is delayed between 7-9 minutes, the survival rate is significantly small. Quick response from first responders equipped with an AED is the difference to a victim of sudden cardiac arrest.

Beachwood police officers are these first responders. During 2009, there was one deployment of an AED on a medical emergency in which Beachwood police officers were first on scene and activated the unit.

The case involved a contractor working at an area nursing home who collapsed near a loading dock. Nurses from the nursing home provided CPR care while Beachwood police officers deployed the AED. In this case, the police officers arrived on scene prior to paramedics and deployed the AED which found no shockable heart rhythm. The officers, assisted by the nurses, continued CPR until paramedics took over patient care then transported the patient to a local hospital.

Police officers equipped with AEDs augment and support paramedic services and provide victims of SCA a chance to survive their episode or receive cardiac care long enough for more intensive care at area hospitals. In the above case, the patient was transported to a local hospital for advanced care. The patient received an AED administered shock which assisted in prolonging the opportunity to benefit from advanced care.

Police officers equipped with AEDs support emergency medical services, save lives, and promote the mission of the Beachwood police department *"...to affirmatively promote, preserve and deliver a feeling of security, safety, and quality of services to members of our community."*

# **TRAFFIC REPORT**

## **TRAFFIC BUREAU STAFF**

The Traffic Bureau is supervised by Commander Patrick T. Sullivan. Both Ptl. Robert Brininger and Ptl. Martin are assigned full-time to the Traffic Bureau.

## **TRAFFIC SAFETY ENFORCEMENT ANNUAL REVIEW**

The purpose of this report is to review our traffic safety enforcement activity to determine if our enforcement activities are directed to the areas where there are traffic complaints, crash activity or random safety enforcement. This report is broad based and will review various aspects of traffic conditions throughout the City of Beachwood.

## **CRASH ACTIVITY**

In 2009, there were 870 motor vehicle crashes reported to the Beachwood Police Department. Of this total, 236 occurred on private property. These crashes usually involve minor damage to the vehicles or properties involved and are normally self-reported to the department by the crash participants. Because of the limited enforcement powers we have on private property, officers do not normally respond to private property crashes unless there is serious physical injury, disabling damage and/or some type of dispute between the participants. Many times a report is not even made until some type of conflict or dispute comes up. The 236 private property crashes that were reported to us will not be included in any further review.

## **FATAL CRASHES**

We had one fatal crash in 2009. On Thursday July 9, 2009 at 12:56 P.M. a 78 year old male was driving alone in his 1993 Oldsmobile 88 traveling westbound on Shaker Blvd. After traveling through the intersection of Richmond Road, the male left the roadway striking two signs, one fire hydrant and then a utility pole. It is unknown if a medical event caused the crash or if the crash subsequently caused the medical event.

## **PEDESTRIAN INVOLVED CRASHES**

There was one crash involving a pedestrian in 2009. On Monday July 13, 2009 at 6:46 P.M. a female was walking from the southeast corner of Commerce Park and Chagrin Blvd. intending to cross to the northeast corner. The pedestrian was within the crosswalk but was crossing against a "DO NOT WALK" signal. A 54 year old female motorist was making a left turn from

Fire Station drive onto eastbound Chagrin Blvd. with a left turn arrow and struck the female in the crosswalk. The pedestrian suffered incapacitating injuries. The female was transported to Hillcrest Hospital. After review by the prosecutor, the pedestrian was listed at fault in this crash but was not issued a citation.

## **CAUSATIVE FACTORS AND ENFORCEMENT**

Of the remaining crashes, failure to maintain an assured clear distance ahead was listed as the causative factor in 261 crashes. 250 drivers were issued citations for Failure to Maintain an Assured Clear Distance Ahead. In many cases, speed can be directly attributed to this type of crash. However, we have seen a dramatic increase in cell phone use, i.e. calling, texting, e-mails etc. and it is our opinion that many of these crashes are directly related to driver inattention and or failure to maintain full time and attention to the operation of the motor vehicle. 91 violators were convicted of failure to maintain full time and attention. Some charges were amended in court to this charge by the Prosecutor and/or the Magistrate.

1066 citations were issued for various speed violations.

Failure to Yield was listed as the causative factor on 44 crash reports. The Ohio OH-1 report does not differentiate between the various failure to yield violations. A review of our enforcement activity revealed the following:

- 21 citations issued for Failure to Yield while turning left.
- 66 citations issued for Failure to Yield at a stop or yield sign.
- 21 citations issued for Failure to Yield from a private drive.

Improper lane change was listed as the causative factor on 62 reports; 53 citations were issued.

Failure to control was listed as the causative factor on 71 reports; 72 citations were issued.

Red light violation was listed as the causative factor on 8 reports; 82 citations were issued.

Improper backing was listed as the causative factor on 16 reports; 13 citations were issued.

## **HIGH ACCIDENT LOCATIONS**

Overall crash activity on Chagrin Blvd. revealed a decline of 9 reports. Most of the reported crashes were assured clear distance violations and lane change violations. Intersection related crashes at Richmond/Chagrin decreased by 4 reports and Chagrin and Parkeast decreased by 2 reports. A total of 740 citations were issued to violators on Chagrin Blvd.

However, crash activity on Richmond Road showed a decrease of 9 reports. A total of 708 citations were issued to violators on Richmond Road.

Crash activity on Cedar Road showed an increase of 20 reported crashes. A total of 303 citations were issued to violators on Cedar Road for various traffic offenses.

### **INTERSECTION ACTIVITY**

1. Parkeast Road and Chagrin Blvd.: As mentioned this location revealed a decrease in crash activity by 2 reports.
2. Chagrin Blvd. and Richmond Road: Showed a decrease of 4 reports.

### **INTERSTATE I-271**

The following crash activity occurred on I-271 northbound, southbound and includes all exit and entrance ramps:

1. On I-271 northbound, 3 crashes were reported.
2. On I-271 northbound exit to Chagrin Blvd., 1 crash was reported.
3. On I-271 northbound express lanes, no crashes were reported.
4. On I-271 southbound, 93 crashes were reported.
5. On I-271 southbound entrance ramp from Cedar Road, 7 crashes were reported.
6. On I-271 southbound exit ramp to Chagrin Blvd., 10 crashes were reported.
7. On I-271 southbound exit ramp to Harvard Road, 2 crashes were reported.
8. On I-271 southbound express lanes, 28 crashes were reported.

Failure to control was the most frequently listed causative factor in these crashes followed closely by assured clear distance and improper lane change violations. Many of these crashes are a direct result of speed that was excessive for the conditions and driver inattention. Overall, 693 citations were issued on the interstate for various traffic violations. We should maintain our high profile enforcement in this area.

### **TRAFFIC COMPLAINTS**

The Beachwood Police Department receives some type of traffic complaint or concern from a motorist almost everyday. The complaints range from suspected intoxicated drivers to a simple complaint of debris on the roadway.

When a traffic complaint is received our response is limited to three or four different options. If the complaint is about a missing traffic sign or malfunctioning traffic signal, the traffic bureau will coordinate the adjustment, replacement or repair. Many times the complainant simply has a question that may need to be answered.

If the complaint involves motorists not obeying some type of traffic law, a police unit is dispatched and the complaint is also reviewed by the traffic bureau for further police response. After review, a special attention notice is posted and officers direct their discretionary enforcement time to the problem area. The following postings were made in 2009:

Problem areas in 2009:

1. Blocking the intersection on Richmond Road at Bryden.
2. Speed complaints on Sulgrave between Shaker Blvd. and Fairmount Blvd.
3. Speed complaints on Hilltop.
4. Stop sign violations on Halcyon.
5. Passing stopped school busses.

The increase of traffic complaints regarding blocking the intersection of Richmond and Bryden Roads continue. This complaint is only expected to get worse due to some planned construction activity on Richmond Road that will create some delays.

The speed complaints on Sulgrave still remain particularly problematic. This section of Sulgrave runs in a north to south direction between westbound Shaker Blvd. and Fairmount Blvd. The southbound side of the street is located in Shaker Heights and the northbound side is located in Beachwood. The majority of the speed violators are on the Beachwood side of the street as traffic uses this street as a short cut to avoid the intersection of Shaker and Green Roads. This short cut can actually take two traffic lights out of the route if the motorist intends on travelling north on Green Road or west on Fairmount Blvd. It also makes the left turn much easier at Sulgrave and Fairmount rather than Green and Fairmount. Residents from Shaker Heights have asked for speed bumps and various other traffic calming solutions. Possible one-way traffic options were explored. Strict enforcement in this area should be maintained.

The speed complaints on Hilltop continue. Strict enforcement should be maintained. We were not able to install the speed advisory sign in 2009.

Stop sign violations continue along Halcyon at the various intersections. Strict enforcement should be maintained.

Passing stopped school busses are still a frequent area of complaint. It is suggested that the bus stop location at Richmond Road and George Zeiger Drive be relocated. The stop is too close to the intersection and is confusing to motorists. Strict enforcement should be maintained.

## **OVI ARRESTS AND ENFORCEMENT**

The Beachwood Police Department made 73 arrests for operating a vehicle while intoxicated. A review of the arrests revealed that:

- 16 arrests occurred along Richmond Road.
- 15 arrests occurred along I-271 southbound.
- 2 arrests occurred along I-271 northbound.
- 12 arrests occurred along Cedar Road.
- 14 arrests occurred along Chagrin Blvd.
- 2 arrests along Green Road.

- 12 arrests occurred in other areas with no specific pattern.

86% of OVI arrests were made between 2000 hours and 0400 hours. The busiest days of the week for OVI activity was late Saturday night and early Sunday morning. The busiest month of the year was April with 10 OVI arrests made.

## **OVERALL TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT**

Overall, our traffic enforcement program is on target with our intentions to direct our focus on specific problem areas but not at the expense of other areas. We should maintain our consistent level of enforcement along our major streets and highways. We will continue to direct our discretionary enforcement time to the areas where complaints have been received.

## **GOALS FOR 2010**

1. Better utilize the police motorcycles to respond to complaint areas, specifically the residential areas and the major intersections. Four additional officers were trained in 2009 and one more officer will receive training in 2010.
2. Maintain a strict approach to speed violators on Sulgrave and Hilltop.
3. Maintain a strict approach to school bus violations and school zone violations throughout the city.
4. Install semi-permanent speed monitoring device on Hilltop Road.

Maintain a strict approach to stop sign violators on Halcyon.

## **ENGINEERING**

The Chagrin Blvd. ITS project is proceeding on schedule. The project is expected to go out to bid sometime in September of 2010. The engineering firm of *URS Consultants* is in charge of this project.

The installation of a new traffic signal and the upgrade of the signal at Richmond and Spectrum has been completed. A second traffic signal, at what will be the main driveway of the new hospital, is expected to go on-line within the next few months. Tom Krezco is in charge of this project.

The city has plans to do substantial road repair on Richmond Road and S. Woodland. This project should start the first week of June and should be completed before the first bus rolls out for the start of school in September.

Mr. Krezco, the staff engineer for the City of Beachwood is currently involved with the normal road maintenance program, and future road repair and paving programs for the 2010 repair season will be announced shortly.

There are no other traffic engineering issues for review.

## **TOWED VEHICLES ANNUAL REPORT**

In 2009, the Traffic Bureau managed the Beachwood Police Department vehicle towing operation. This operation includes overseeing the towing and impounding of vehicles seized during the routine performance of police duties and the disposal of all unclaimed vehicles in accordance with state law. Complete records of all vehicles towed and their disposition are maintained.

At the start of 2009, the Beachwood Police Department contracted with two tow companies to provide towing services. The companies were Interstate Towing and Mooney's Towing. On July 14, 2009 the Beachwood Police contracted with a third tow company, Rich's Towing. Police dispatchers used a rotation system to ensure that each company gets an equitable share of the police tows. Exceptions to this rotation are if a tow company either cannot respond at the time requested or cannot respond with specific requested equipment such as a flatbed or dolly. Interstate Towing and Rich's Towing are equipped to handle large tows of semi's and heavy equipment. As part of a multi-departmental investigation, D & L Towing towed eight vehicles for the Beachwood Police. Tow companies were authorized to charge \$100 for a standard tow (additional fees for extra labor, i.e. use of a dolly, winch-outs, etc.) and \$12 per day for storage.

In 2009, there were 536 vehicles towed, this includes 94 private tows. Private tows are those that the Police may have called for at the request of the driver but no further Police action was taken. Of all the vehicles towed, 26 were unclaimed and scrapped.

## **TRAFFIC SIGNAL REPORT**

The Beachwood Police Traffic Bureau is assigned the tasks of monitoring and maintaining the four closed loop traffic systems and thirty-eight (38) traffic signals belonging to the City of Beachwood.

The monitoring of traffic signals is done on a daily basis by a central traffic computer located in the Traffic Bureau. Officers also observe the traffic systems while on patrol to make sure that the signals are working properly.

While officers do not repair the traffic signals, they are usually the first person to realize there is a problem with a traffic signal. When a hardware problem is detected, the Beachwood Police call the Signal Service Company in Warrensville Heights. Signal Service responded to 200 repair calls for the City of Beachwood in 2009. While most of these involved minor repairs such as bulb replacement, there were some that were for the infrastructure: loops, wiring, and cabinets. The infrastructure repairs are usually very costly because of the man-hours involved in repairing the item. The cost of all repairs was approximately \$55,000.00. The conflict monitor testing that is done on an annual basis was performed on 23 of the 38 intersections. Of the 23 that were done, one conflict monitor had to be sent out for repair because it failed the test.

### **OVI ENFORCEMENT REPORT**

In 2009, the Beachwood Police Department made seventy-three (73) arrests for persons who were Operating a Vehicle while Under the Influence of alcohol and/or drugs (O.V.I.). Of the seventy-three (73) arrests made, fifty-nine (59) were male and fourteen (14) were female. There were no juvenile arrests in 2009.

Forty-six (46) of the arrested persons submitted to a breath sample with the average Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) level being .179, which is over twice the legal limit of .08. The highest reading was .297, which is over three (3X) times the legal limit. Twenty-three (23) persons refused to provide a sample. The number of violators refusing the test has been a constant over the last two (2) years. In 2007, 37% of violators refused and 39% did in 2008. In 2009, the number dropped to 31%.

Due to exigent circumstances, six (6) persons were requested to provide blood samples. Four (4) of those persons submitted to the test, two (2) refused. Of the four (4) who submitted, one (1) was found to be impaired by alcohol, one (1) tested positive for alcohol and drugs and one (1) was found to be negative for both alcohol and drugs. One (1) result is still pending.

Twenty-eight (28) of the violators had at least one (1) prior conviction with seven (7) having two (2) or more priors. One (1) offender had five (5) prior convictions and five (5) offenders had three (3). The percentage of repeat offenders had shown a steady decline over the last few years, before making a slight jump in 2009. In 2007 the number of repeat offenders was 34% and in 2008 the number decreased to 29%. The number increased to 38% in 2009.

### TRAFFIC CRASH ANALYSIS

A careful review of the 2009 traffic crash activity revealed the following:

1. The total number of crash reports taken decreased by 29 reports.
2. Private property crash reports decreased by 16 reports.
3. On street self reported crashes decreased by 14 reports.
4. On street crash reports taken by officers increased by one report.
5. There was one fatal crash in 2009. There were no fatal crashes in 2008.
6. Reported crashes where people claimed injury decreased by six reports.
7. The number of people injured in Beachwood crashes increased by four.
8. The man hours spent taking reports remained the same at 678 hours.

9. For the third year in a row, intersection related crashes showed another decrease. 2009 had a decrease of 14 less intersection related crashes that in 2008.
10. Driveway access related crashes showed a decrease of 16 crashes.
11. Non-intersection related crashes showed a significant increase of 41 crashes.
12. The busiest month for crash activity was January with 66 crash reports taken. In 2008, December was the busiest month for crash activity.
13. The busiest day of the week was Tuesday with 96 crash reports taken. Tuesday was also the busiest day in 2008. The second busiest day of the week was Thursday with 93 crash reports taken.
14. The busiest time of the day for crash activity was between 4pm and 6pm.
15. In 2009, Richmond Road showed a decline in crash activity with nine less crashes reported.
16. Chagrin Blvd. showed a decline in crash activity with nine less crashes reported.
17. I-271 & related ramps showed modest increase of crash activity with two additional crashes reported.
18. Cedar Road showed a significant increase in crash activity with 20 more crashes reported.
19. The average age of a driver who received a citation as a result of crash involvement decreased to 41.5 from last years average of 43.0.
20. Crashes where the causative factor was failure to maintain an assured clear distance ahead totaled 261 reports, an increase of 7 from 2008. Excessive speed, driver inattention and tailgating certainly contribute to this crash activity.
21. Dry road conditions were listed on 322 crash reports, a decrease of one report over 2008. Wet roadways had an increase of 18 reports over 2008 and snow/ice covered roadways showed a decrease of 8 crash reports over 2008.

# **INVESTIGATIVE UNITS REPORT**

## **DETECTIVE BUREAU**

The numbers of reports received for specific types of crimes are reviewed each year. It is expected that fluctuations in crimes reported in most categories will vary somewhat from year to year. 2009 statistics show that theft and theft related offenses generate the highest number of investigations which has been the case for many years. A reduction in the number of robberies and stolen vehicles was observed while crimes such as theft from vehicles and domestic violence increased in frequency. Residential burglaries were more prevalent in 2009 than the previous year. Anyone wanting a more specific breakdown of crimes by type may refer to the annual crime statistics summary for 2009. Several hundred investigations were conducted by the detectives and members of the fourth platoon in 2009. Some cases of interest are summarized below.

Officers of the fourth platoon and other police agencies concluded a two and a half year drug investigation which resulted in the arrest of multiple suspects and a seizure of assets valued at more than 1.5 million dollars.

A suspect was arrested for breaking into vehicles and stealing credit cards. Investigation revealed that he was manufacturing fake driver's licenses and using them in conjunction with the stolen cards to make nearly \$40,000.00 in fraudulent purchases.

An alert citizen reported what she believed to be a suspicious male following her at a local mall. Investigation of the complaint by detectives resulted in the suspect being charged and convicted of stalking for which he was sentenced to one and one half years in prison.

A resident reported that her home had just been entered by an unknown female. The suspect vehicle was stopped by police shortly after the crime was reported and two suspects were taken into custody and charged with burglary. In an unrelated case, a burglary suspect was caught on a residential security camera. Following the investigation by the detectives, a warrant was issued for the arrest of the suspect who was initially identified with help from a neighboring police department.

In order to reach the goal of quality service to the community, members of the detective bureau strive to maintain good working relationships with allied agencies and neighboring police departments as well as taking advantage of training opportunities and technological advancements that serve the law enforcement community. The Beachwood Police Department has been on board with the prosecutor's efforts to more efficiently process criminal cases within the county and continues to take advantage of new case management technology such as electronic case filing and video Grand Jury testimony. Our good working relationship with neighboring communities assisted in solving crimes occurring within Beachwood and other

communities in two thousand nine, reinforcing the belief that these objectives have helped us to keep on track with our stated goal.

## **JUVENILE DIVISION**

The Juvenile Division was assigned 88 total cases in the year 2009. Eight were adult investigations and 80 were juvenile cases. A total of 105 juveniles were physically arrested in 2009. A total of 53 juveniles were placed in the Beachwood Police Department Diversion Program, completing over 150 hours of community service.

49 juveniles were charged through Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court.

7 felony arrests were recorded with 1 juvenile being transported to the Cuyahoga County Detention Center. 4 juveniles were referred to outside agencies or school intervention.

A total of 13 resident juveniles were arrested in the year 2009. This number is basically the same as last year. The dramatic decline the last three years is attributed to concentrating our efforts toward our habitual resident youth, directing a more aggressive response and/or court intervention attitude. 1 juvenile was arrested for Arson, 2 for Theft, 6 for Drug/Alcohol Violations, 2 for Assault and 2 for Domestic Violence.

A total of 88 non-resident juveniles were arrested in the year 2009. Of that, 82 were arrested for Theft/Shoplifting / RSP, 1 for Grand Theft Auto, 1 for Aggravated Menacing, 2 for Felony Theft, 1 for Domestic Violence and 1 for Disorderly Conduct.

## **JUVENILE DIVERSION PROGRAM**

The Beachwood Police Department Diversion Program has been a benefit to the victims, offenders and the community once again this year. This program is operated by our police department and most of the community service hours are completed in our community for our community.

This program would not have been successful without open communication and cooperation from Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Intake Office Manager, John William Tutt (who will be retiring at the end of 2009). His expertise and guidance was invaluable to this department and the community it serves.

Our Diversion Program included juvenile offenders washing and waxing police vehicles, organizing authorized police environments, assisting with roadside trash clean up and city landscaping duties. It also provided community service hours to Menorah Park Center for Senior Living and the Montefiore Nursing and Health Care Center by assisting the facilities with elderly patients in their volunteer programs.

In 2009, we continued the practice of non-resident offenders completing service hours in their own community, volunteering at local soup kitchens, homeless shelters, drug and alcohol rehabilitation centers, churches, temples and synagogues.

The objective of the Juvenile Division Diversion Program is to provide effective individual treatment to help and guide the first time offender rather than simply put them “through the Juvenile Court system.” It implements alternative disciplines by utilizing outside resources with both professional and personal interaction between the parents, victims, offenders, schools and community resources.

# **TRAINING REPORT**

## **DEFENSIVE TACTICS**

While on duty, police officers may encounter violent resistance or dangerous assaults against them. The officers may use force to defend themselves and control situations. The Beachwood Police Department provides officers with different use of force options to protect and defend others and themselves. Officers also receive training on the agency use of force policy which provides “guidelines to make force decisions in a professional, impartial, and safe manner” (.50 Use of Force policy). The following are some of the tools available to officers to defend themselves and control situations.

### *Electronic Control Devices*

Trained police officers carry a Taser X26 electronic control device as a use of force option. “Electronic Control Devices (ECD) use propelled wires or direct contact to conduct energy to affect the sensory and motor functions of the nervous system.” (Taser International Instructor certification lesson plan, Version 13.0 May, 2006, page 18). Recertification training for the Taser was conducted in 2009.

### *Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) Aerosol Spray*

Department police officers are equipped with canisters of Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) aerosol sprays. OC spray, which is commonly referred to as pepper spray, is a safe and effective police tool to help officers gain control of non-compliant individuals. OC is an inflammatory which is a derivative of cayenne pepper. If applied, it will cause the involuntary closing of the eyes and will impair a person’s breathing. It will also create an intense burning sensation to the exposed areas. It takes effect immediately and is most effective when inhaled. Symptomatic effects can last up to 45 minutes. When officers are initially trained in the concepts and use of OC spray, they receive exposure to it to allow them to better understand its potential effects and limitations. Recertification training for the OC spray was conducted in 2009.

### *PR-24 Control Batons*

Department police officers are equipped with PR-24 control batons. The baton is an instrument designed to help officers defend themselves and others against a physical assault and also to help control non-compliant subjects. The baton can be carried on an officer’s duty belt during a tour of duty. In 2009, applicable officers were recertified on the PR-24 control baton.

### *RIPP Restraints*

The department provides police and correction personnel with additional restraints to help control resisting subjects or arrested persons who are escape risks. These restraints include the RIPP Restraint Hobbles and the Arm and Ankle Restrainers.

### *Spit/Bite Protective Devices*

The Beachwood Police department also provides protective equipment for its police officers to protect them from subjects who may try to bite them or spit at them. These tools can also help protect them from infectious diseases from subjects under arrests. They include the Tranzport Hoods and Protection Masks. The hoods and masks are located in police cruisers and all department police officers are issued an individual Tranzport Hood for duty use.

# **POLICE USE OF FORCE REPORT**

## **USE OF FORCE REPORT**

In compliance with policy 06-01, this is an analysis of all reported use of force incidents which occurred in the year 2009. During 2009, there were five (5) Reportable Use of Force incidents. Each of these incidents was reviewed within seven days of the incident in compliance with this policy. The following is a brief synopsis of each of these incidents:

Date: 03-28-2009 CR 0902704

Officers responded on a request for mutual aid from the Shaker Hts. Police Department. Officers located a male at 16125 Parkland Drive in Shaker Hts. who had been walking in the street and was yelling at passing motorists. This subject was subsequently arrested for OVI and was transported to South Point Hospital for a blood draw and possible treatment for psychiatric issues. The subject was argumentative at the scene and during the transport to the hospital. While at the hospital the subject charged at officers and tried to flee from the hospital. The subject was taken to the floor and control holds were used to gain compliance until he could be secured. The subject was not injured.

THE USE OF FORCE WAS JUSTIFIED.

Date: 04-23-2009 CR 0903527

Officers responded to Dillard's, 26500 Cedar Road where an adult male was arrested for theft of clothing. The subject was observed concealing clothing by officers on scene and was advised that he was under arrest for theft. The subject began to run through the store in an effort to escape from the officers. The subject was subsequently tackled to the floor inside Dillard's and handcuffed. The subject was not injured.

THE USE OF FORCE WAS JUSTIFIED.

Date: 08-29-2009 CR 0907670

Officers responded to Dillard's, 26500 Cedar Road where a juvenile male was arrested for theft of clothing. The subject was observed concealing clothing and was approached by officers in the store. The subject was advised that he was under arrest at which time the subject pulled away from officers and resisted arrest. The subject was forced to the floor by officers where he was subsequently handcuffed and taken into custody. The subject was not injured.

THE USE OF FORCE WAS JUSTIFIED.

Date: 12-14-2009 CR 0911087

Officers responded to 3426 Old Green Road on a report of a disturbance. It was determined by officers on the scene that the disturbance was the result of an argument between a mother and her adult son who both resided at the address. Officers interviewed the subjects and it was learned that the son had threatened to use violence against the building superintendant just prior to officer's arrival. The mother also advised officers that her son may have "mental problems."

During the interview, the son was agitated and defiant towards officers when he was advised that he was under arrest. A kitchen knife fell from the son's clothing as he ran from officers leaving the apartment. The son was subsequently subdued in the parking lot where he further resisted arrest. Officers equipped with the Taser X26 used a "drive stun" to gain compliance allowing them to handcuff the subject. The subject was transported to South Point Hospital for an emergency psychiatric evaluation. The subject was not injured.

THE USE OF FORCE WAS JUSTIFIED

Date: 12-31-2009 CR 0911644

Officers responded to 24200 Chagrin Blvd, Connections, on a report of a subject being probated due to a psychiatric situation. An adult male subject was being treated at that location and had attempted suicide three previous times and made suicidal comments to the doctor on this date. The subject would not voluntarily get into the rescue squad for transport to the hospital for a probated evaluation. Officers on scene used a hobble restraint and handcuffs to allow paramedics to transport the subject to the hospital. The subject was not injured.

THE USE OF FORCE WAS JUSTIFIED.

The review of the Reportable Use of Force incidents for 2009 does not show any incidents in which excessive force was used by any officer of the department. The incidents showed that officers used an appropriate level of force necessary to gain control of the subjects involved. It should also be noted that there were no public complaints received or filed with this department that alleged that excessive force was used by officers of this department.

The number of reportable use of force incidents for 2009 does fall within the average range of reported incidents over the span of the past 5 years. Furthermore, no patterns were detected involving officers involved in each of these incidents.

It should also be noted that beginning in August of 2006, uniform patrol officers were issued and received certified training in the TASER X26 Electronic Control Device. Department officers must re-certify every year with this device. The TASER was utilized only once during the 2009 calendar year.

The annual "in service" training programs conducted by this department in the areas of the use of force and departmental policies has kept our officers current and up to date in this regard. There are no apparent needs for additional equipment or additional training above what officers are currently receiving. The use of force policy 06-01 has been reviewed and does not require changes or updating.

## **HOT PURSUIT REPORT**

Two pursuit reviews were completed in 2009 by Commander Sullivan. One involved the pursuit of a stolen vehicle and the other involved the pursuit of speeding motorcyclists. Neither situation was determined to be in compliance with the department's Hot Pursuit policy. In the pursuit of the stolen vehicle, areas of concern were the use of a Ford Expedition, the

actions of the assisting unit and radio traffic. In the second pursuit, areas of concern were the driving actions of the pursuing cruiser.

The 2008 Hot Pursuit report indicated consideration for a training class that would involve simulated pursuits and also one for actual driving training. It also indicated that an effort would be made to send patrol officers to outside training involving pursuits and emergency/tactical vehicle operations. During the year, three sergeants attended “Supervisor’s role during and after pursuits” training. Also, two dispatchers attended “Dispatching for emergency response and pursuit” and two officers received tactical driving training. These courses were provided through OPOTA.

An in-service training program on police pursuit training involving policy compliance/use of discretion and judgment was started. The course objectives and student performance objectives are listed.

#### Course objectives

Provide a review of the department policy on police pursuits with emphasis on the justification for a pursuit and the responsibilities and procedures of police officers, dispatchers and supervisors during a pursuit.

Provide police pursuit training scenarios for officers to practice compliance with pursuit procedures, particularly radio transmissions, and their use of discretion and judgment on whether a pursuit should continue or be stopped.

Provide follow-up discussion on officer and dispatcher performance during the training exercises. Particular attention will be given to the decision making process of the officer on when to pursue or not pursue and the justification.

#### Student performance objectives

Police officers and dispatchers will demonstrate an understanding of the department policy on police pursuits and their responsibilities during a pursuit.

Police officers and dispatchers will participate in pursuit training scenarios.  
Police officers and dispatchers will evaluate their actions in follow discussion after each exercise.

### **ILLEGAL PROFILING REPORT**

In compliance with policy 06-19, an annual review has been conducted of the department’s practices regarding profiling, citizen complaints/concerns, traffic stop statistics and any other signs of violations of this policy. As part of this ongoing process, monthly reviews were conducted by each of the three patrol shift supervisors throughout the year monitoring citation,

arrest, and citizen complaint statistics. There was no cause for intervention by the shift supervisors during this 12 month review period.

In reviewing the officer activity reports, it is important to acknowledge the following unique characteristics of the City of Beachwood. The resident population of the city is approximately 12,000 people, but the daytime and afternoon population increases to approximately 100,000 people with business and retail activity in the city. It should also be noted that due to the geographic location of our city and the development of the area, Beachwood has four of the top ten busiest intersections in Cuyahoga County with Cedar Road, Chagrin Blvd and Interstate 271 accounting for high volumes of vehicular traffic flow daily.

The statistics indicated the following: of the 2489 citations issued by the uniform patrol during this review period, 65% were issued to white motorists, 28% were issued to black motorists and 2% were issued to Asian motorists. These citations were also further broken down by gender. This breakdown indicates that 52% were issued to male drivers and 48% were issued to female drivers. These percentages mirror the most recent U.S Census Bureau statistics for Cuyahoga County. In comparison, over the past 3 years, the departmental statistics have remained fairly consistent with no dramatic increases or decreases in any category.

There was one (1) citizen complaint registered with this department alleging that illegal profiling had taken place. This complaint was investigated by the Detective Bureau Commander and was determined to be unfounded. Individual officer statistics and officer activity are continually reviewed by shift Sergeants and Lieutenants. The year end statistics do not reflect any abnormal officer activities and are consistent as compared to last year's activities.

The total numbers of traffic citations issued were also reviewed for the last four years. Only slight increases have been noted from year to year which would be consistent with an increase in the department staffing in the uniform patrol.

The department has conducted annual in service training which included training in the areas of traffic stops, illegal profiling, officer discretion, use of force, search and seizure, cultural influence, traffic enforcement and officer ethics and values. The review indicated that the department is in full compliance with this policy. The department will continue to be proactive in this area and responsive to any concerns of illegal profiling

## **MAYOR'S COURT REPORT**

Beachwood Mayor's Court processes and hears all uncontested non-serious misdemeanor offenses. If a case is contested, the case is then transferred to the Shaker Heights Municipal Court in Shaker Heights, Ohio. All felony or serious offenses are automatically processed by either Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court, in the case of a felony, or Shaker Heights Municipal Court, in the case of a serious offense.

In 2009, 2290 traffic and 60 criminal cases were filed with the Beachwood Mayor's Court. A total of 643 parking violations were filed with the court.

In 2009, Mayor's Court transferred 86 contested cases to Shaker Heights Municipal Court. There were 540 cases filed directly with Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court, Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, or Shaker Heights Municipal Court.

# **SPECIALTY UNITS REPORT**

## **COMPUTER CRIMES/FORENSIC UNIT**

The Beachwood Police Department has the ability to examine most computers, investigate computer related crimes, and to view and enhance most video within the department. Rather than taking months to have a computer, video tape or file examined by outside agencies, the department has the ability to do it in house.

Currently there are three officers trained to handle such cases. Ptl. Daniel Grein, Ptl. John Finucan, and Ptl. Aaron Lieb are trained in processing and enhancing video tapes or files. Ptl. Grein is also certified to process computer data recovery.

In 2009, a total of 10 Computer related cases were investigated. The cases are outlined as:

1. *Drug Trafficking –Assisted 4<sup>th</sup> Platoon Investigators in a search warrant of a major drug trafficker and examined several computers. Discovered thousands of hours of security video recorded to a computer from the suspect’s home, which provided extremely clear and convincing evidence for the case. (Report 07-05997)*
2. *Website Hack –Assisted with a website hacking investigation. (Report 09-00159).*
3. *Fraud –Imaged a computer and several cellular phones for a credit card fraud investigation. (Report 09-00628)*
4. *Suspicious Email –Investigated email harassment. The email was successfully traced, but the perpetrator was not identified. (Report 09-00723)*
5. *Stalking –Examined and obtained evidence from a cell phone that contained numerous images of women a male subject was following at the Beachwood Place Mall. (Report 09-01197)*
6. *Email Harassment –Assisted patrol division with an email harassment investigation. The email was successfully traced and the perpetrator was identified. (Report 09-04229)*
7. *Fraud –Imagined and processed several computers as Mutual Aid to the County Mortgage Fraud Task Force. (Report 09-06820)*
8. *Burglary –Recovered and Enhanced Surveillance Video of a burglary from a resident’s security system. The examination and investigation by the detective bureau led to the identity of the burglar who now has an outstanding warrant for his arrest. (Report 09-09348)*
9. *Harassing Communication/Impersonating a Peace Officer –Cell phone examination involving a series of harassing text messaging where the subject claimed to be a police officer. (Report 09-10776)*

10. *Indecent Exposure –Data Recovery performed on a cell phone where the perpetrator used the victim’s cell phone to take pictures of his genital. (Report 09-11250)*

In 2009, a total of 5 Video related cases were handled by the unit. The cases are outlined as:

1. *Video examination of pursuit and arrest of theft suspect. (Report 09-03203)*
2. *Video examination of theft caught on tape at Dillard’s. (Report 09-05773)*
3. *Video examination of theft caught on tape at Dillard’s. (Report 09-05802)*
4. *Video examination of theft caught on tape at Sak’s Fifth Avenue. (Report 09-07333)*
5. *Video examination of numerous videos of suspects involved in a fatal motor vehicle accident, which lead to guilty pleas. (Report 09-09662)*

As computer crimes increase and become more sophisticated, the Beachwood Police Department has continued to improve its officer’s technology and training and is planning on training an additional officer to assist with the computer examinations.

## **SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS**

The City of Beachwood provides adult school crossing guards at various posts throughout the City. The current posts are:

## **HONOR GUARD**

The Honor Guard is a valuable public relations tool that promotes a positive public image of the police and assists in recruiting young people to law enforcement. The Honor Guard is viewed by the public during special circumstances such as funerals, parades, or other ceremonies. For this reason, the unit’s members are equipped with special uniforms, leather gear and footwear to enhance their appearance. The Honor Guard typically attends funerals for fallen active officers, retired officers, or family members of active officers.

The Beachwood Police Department Honor Guard consists of six volunteer officers including Sgt. Gary Haba, who served in the U.S. Army as a member of the 3<sup>rd</sup> US Infantry “The Old Guard”. Stationed at Ft. Myer, Virginia, “The Old Guard” performs various ceremonial duties including funerals at Arlington National Cemetery, retirement and other ceremonies for high-ranking military and government officials, and guarding The Tomb Of The Unknown Soldiers.

In 2009, members of the unit attended the funeral for Boston Heights Officer Dean, who was killed in the line of duty by a passing motorist while removing debris from the roadway.

In 2010, the Honor Guard is looking forward to participating in the parade for Police Memorial Week in May. This parade is attended by hundreds of officers from all over the region, including Canada, and viewed by thousands of spectators in downtown Cleveland. The unit will also present the Colors at a conference for a national police organization in May.

#### **FOURTH PLATOON**

The following is an overview of the activities and independent investigations of the fourth platoon for the year 2009. The fourth platoon consists of a Sgt. Supervisor, investigators and uniformed patrol officers. Staffing for the fourth platoon has fluctuated throughout the year due to personnel and shift staffing issues. The uniformed officers provided supplemental manpower to the shifts during peak demand hours and provided staffing during manpower shortages. The uniformed officers assisted the fourth platoon investigators with plain clothes operations and performed plain clothes crime specific details in response to crime trends.

Fourth platoon investigators spent the majority of the year investigating a large scale marijuana trafficking organization that has been conducting illegal activity in Beachwood as well as the surrounding suburbs since 2007. The investigators learned that the organization was obtaining marijuana and prescription drugs from the Northern District of New York near the Canadian border. Contact was made with investigators from the Franklin County Narcotics Border Task Force and all agencies worked together to dismantle the drug trafficking organization. A New York state wiretap was initiated which ultimately lead to the arrest of multiple individuals as well as the execution of more than ten search warrants in Ohio. The case resulted in the seizure of money and assets as well as real property.

The fourth platoon also initiated two other drug trafficking cases involving individuals selling marijuana within the City of Beachwood. One of the cases resulted in a search warrant being conducted at a residence in Beachwood which lead to the discovery of several marijuana plants and materials for cultivating marijuana.

The fourth platoon assisted the Detective Bureau in the investigation of several cases. One case in particular involved the arrest of an individual with a past history of stalking females. This male was considered a danger to females at area malls, based on his criminal activity. A warrant was subsequently issued for his arrest. Fourth platoon investigators conducted

surveillance at several locations where the suspect was known to be living and arrested this male once he was located.

In addition to that above mentioned cases, the fourth platoon investigators and the fourth platoon uniformed officers conducted several details targeting specific crimes identified by the crime analysis as rising during the quarterly analysis. (Burglaries, Theft from Auto)

The fourth platoon investigators are currently assisting a federal agency with the investigation of a large scale drug trafficking organization. This is a complex case and may take several months to identify all parties involved, to locate any properties and assets and to obtain evidence for the purpose of convicting those involved in the illegal drug activity.

The fourth platoon uniformed division met its goals for the year by providing supplemental coverage to the shifts during peak work hours and providing shift coverage during times when the shifts were short. The fourth platoon uniformed division also met the goal of addressing crime specific patterns that were identified throughout the year. These will continue to be the goals for 2010.

The fourth platoon investigators reached the goals of assisting the detective bureau on several cases and increasing the number of drug trafficking arrests made during the year. These will continue to be the goals for 2010.

## **MOUNTAIN BIKE UNIT**

The police mountain bike unit consists of seven officers who deploy on bicycles on a part-time basis. Five specially equipped bicycles are used and feature red/blue lights, silent hubs, Kevlar tires, police bags and markings.

Mountain bikes are usually mounted to racks on police cruisers so that officers can transition from vehicle to bicycle patrol and back more quickly. Bicycle officers are capable of responding to any and all police assignments while riding, except for prisoner transports.

There are several advantages of utilizing bicycle patrol officers. These include the ability of officers to patrol areas of special attention inaccessible to cruisers such as the city parks and school property as well as offering an alternative means of patrol that potential criminals are not on the lookout for. The most important advantage, however, is that bicycle officers are more approachable by citizens and result in a large number of positive citizen contacts, including children.

During 2009, the unit was quite active and officers mounted on bicycles were utilized extensively in the city park as both a public relations and enforcement tool. All bicycle officers were equipped with appropriate jackets in 2009 to extend the riding season and further enhance their usefulness.

## RECRUITMENT UNIT ACTIVITY

The active recruiting campaign began in February, 2009 with an outreach to churches in the greater Cleveland area, in an attempt to recruit more minority applicants. The Beachwood Police Department contracted with JEM Consultants, in an effort to make this goal a reality. In January, we met with Rev. Jeff Jimison, of JEM Consultants, to discuss our goals and objectives. In February, Rev. Jimison met with Mayor Gorden, as well as Councilman Arsham, to discuss our initiative.

The month of April kicked off the church initiative. Contact was made with representatives from the Mt. Haven Baptist Church, the Mt. Zion Church of Oakwood, the Providence Baptist Church, and the Grace Missionary Church. Chief Sechrist, Ptl. Draves, and Ptl. Budny attended numerous church events and functions, in an attempt to reach our objective.

The official Police Entrance Examination date was scheduled and announced as March 11, 2010 at the Beachwood Community Center. Recruitment information packets, including contact information cards, were updated and issued to each employee to distribute to interested parties. The City of Beachwood website was updated with a test information sheet in April, including the application period and testing information. It was decided to use the OH-Select written examination offered by I/O Solutions, as well as Cuyahoga Community College (Tri-C) for the physical agility portion of the examination.



The recruiters initiated contact via email with all parties listed in the recruitment database. This email contained a test information sheet, which announced the test date, as well as the application period and requirements almost a year prior to the test date. This early notification and posting on the City of Beachwood website proved extraordinarily beneficial, and was a goal we had set after the last testing process. Ptl. Draves and Ptl. Budny utilized new voicemail accounts to maintain contact with interested parties.

As in the last recruitment process, numerous contacts announcing the upcoming exam were made with Ohio colleges and universities, as well as Ohio police academies. Fifty-three college professors associated with Criminal Justice/Law Enforcement were contacted individually by Ptl. Budny. Contact was made with the NAACP, The Black Shield Association, MCAAPO (Midwest Coalition of African American Police Officers), Hispanic Police Officers Association, National Black Police Officers Association, and the International Association of Women Police. Also, Ptl. Draves and Ptl. Budny visited ITT Technical Institute School of Criminal Justice, as well as job fairs at Lakeland Community College, Notre Dame College, and Cleveland State University. The ability to attend job fairs was also another goal set and attained after the last recruitment campaign.

The test announcement was also posted on various career boards, college websites, as well as police employment websites.

Ptl. Draves continued developing and maintaining the senior project and intern programs, in an effort to reach out to and maintain working relationships with the younger members of the community.

So far, the 2009 Recruitment Campaign has been successful as far as goals are concerned. The following goals were set in 2008 and met during the 2009 campaign:

- The test was announced only after the exact date, time and location were finalized. The information was posted almost a year in advance, as opposed to three months in advance for the 2008 test.

- The postcard notification indicated all pertinent information; however, a change was made, deleting the notification that the subject will receive further updates.

- The application period was set for a period of two weeks, to include an 11 hour period on the two Wednesdays and a 5 hour period on Saturday. These additions were added to accommodate police academy students, as well as those that work during the day.

The only requirement that changed from the 2008 testing process to the 2010 testing process was the requirement that applicants provide a Tri-C Physical Agility Certificate prior to the written examination. Due to the confusion in 2008 when applicants were allowed to bring in their certificate on the day of the test, it was changed to indicate that a Tri-C Physical Agility certificate must be provided at the time of application. Discussion was held regarding the posting of the application on-line, however, it was decided not to initiate that option at this time.

Overall, the recruitment efforts in 2009 proved to be successful. Chief Sechrist, as well as department recruiters utilized new ideas and resources in an attempt to recruit more minorities. More contacts were made than in the past and we took greater advantage of technology (voicemail, websites and email) to disseminate as much information as possible very early on in the campaign.

The immediate goals for the next recruitment campaign are to continue recruiting more minorities and females, in an attempt to represent the makeup of our community. After the application period and testing results are analyzed for this test, our goals and objectives will be re-visited. It should be mentioned that although historically few minorities and females have taken the written test, it should not reflect on the actual recruitment efforts. The recruitment officers have gone above and beyond reaching out to the community in an attempt to make contact with prospective minority and female applicants.

## **EMERGENCY SERVICES UNIT**

In the year 2009, the Beachwood Police Department Emergency Service Team was engaged in the following activity:

1. January 14, 2009: Swat team conducted annual inventory and maintenance of all equipment.
2. February 11, 2009: Swat team conducted weapons training at the Beachwood indoor range.
3. February 18, 2009: Rope team members conducted rope team training review.
4. March 24, 2009: Swat team conducted training with Euclid P.D. at a vacant building in Euclid.
5. April 8, 2009: Swat team members conducted practice drills using the body bunkers. Officers conducted shooting drills using the body bunkers.
6. May 13, 2009: Swat team members conducted firearms training at the Beachwood indoor range.
7. April 16, 2009: Swat officers assisted forth platoon officers with serving a search warrant at 3607 Concord. One male was arrested.
8. April 22, 2009: Swat rope team members conducted training with pulley systems.
9. June 14, 2009: Beachwood officers participated in a joint swat operation that included the execution of simultaneous warrants at multiple locations. Multiple arrests were made and the felony drug cases are pending.
10. July 02, 2009: Swat officers assist the Cuyahoga County Prosecutors Office Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force with a search warrant at 2211 Campus Road.
11. July 23, 2009: Swat officers assist Shaker Heights P.D. with a presidential protection detail reference a town hall meeting. Manpower, equipment and armored car deployed.
12. August 26, 2009: Swat officers assigned to three locations in Beachwood reference a controversial church group who came to Beachwood to protest. No incidents or arrests made.
13. September 3, 2009: Swat officers assist the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force with a search warrant at 27060 Cedar Road, Apt. 705.
14. September 9, 2009: Swat officers attend weapons training at BPD range and train using all camera equipment, thermal imaging and body bunkers.
15. October 14, 2009: Swat officers complete physical fitness testing then participate in hazard training at Beachwood Place Mall. Mall Security, Beachwood Fire Department and Nordstrom's security participate in the training event.
16. October 30, 2009: All swat officers and all sworn officers participate in annual outdoor range qualifications with AR-15 patrol rifles. New swat officer attends practice for the first time.
17. November 11, 2009: Swat officers practice search techniques at the Harvard Road Armory using full uniforms and equipment.
18. December 9, 2009: Swat officers attend weapons training at BPD range.

## **JAIL FACILITY**

In two thousand nine just over seven hundred persons were processed at the Beachwood Police Department reflecting just over a ten percent reduction in arrests as compared to two thousand eight. More than one hundred of those processed were juvenile offenders. Male offenders outnumbered females by a considerable margin. Primary charges for those booked into the jail in two thousand nine continue the trend observed for many years with Theft and Theft related offenses accounting for a significant number of arrests. Warrant service and traffic related offenses add considerably to the total.

Sixty seven time servers were housed at the Beachwood Jail resulting in payments to the city totaling \$16,705.00. The number of time servers housed here reflects an approximate thirty percent reduction over two thousand eight figures based in part to the Cuyahoga County Jail implementing cost saving measures and accepting more offenders into the county facility. These numbers are expected to continue to decline in two thousand ten.

Beachwood Corrections Officers continue to man the reception desk at city hall and this arrangement appears to be working well. The annual jail inspections conducted by the Bureau of Adult Detention were waived for two thousand nine while the state works to revise the standards. New standards are reported to be near completion and it is expected that the annual inspections of the jail will resume this year.

The primary goal as stated for the Beachwood City Jail is to maintain a facility that is safe, secure, in good repair, and in compliance with state regulations. In two thousand nine, no major incidents occurred within the facility and no inmates or corrections officers were injured as a result of altercations within the facility. No prisoners escaped from custody. In lieu of the annual inspection by the Bureau of Adult Detention, an in house assessment was conducted and no areas of concern were noted. Inspections by the fire martial and health department revealed no violations. The jail facility required only routine maintenance for the year keeping us on track with our long term goals.

# **COMMUNITY RELATIONS REPORT**

## **COMMUNITY RELATIONS / CRIME PREVENTION**

*THE MISSION FOR EVERY MEMBER OF THE BEACHWOOD POLICE DEPARTMENT IS TO CONSISTENTLY SEEK AND FIND WAYS TO AFFIRMATIVELY PROMOTE, PRESERVE AND DELIVER A FEELING OF SECURITY, SAFETY AND QUALITY SERVICES TO MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY.*

Effective and efficient community relations and crime prevention efforts play an important role in promoting, preserving and delivering a feeling of security, safety and quality services to those in the City of Beachwood. Efforts at preventing or controlling crime included preventive patrol, the investigation of suspicious or criminal activity and work involving community relations, community policing and crime prevention.

### **Evaluation of service**

Evaluating our level and quality of service in these functions is useful and in 2009 a citizen survey was conducted to gauge the opinion of those we serve. The survey results indicated that our agency is doing a good job overall in striving to accomplish its mission. Citizens who were surveyed felt overall that the agency was professional, its personnel had a good to excellent attitude and were courteous. They felt strongly that the department met their expectations. Ninety-five percent of those surveyed feel safe in Beachwood. Their perception of our agency's ability to provide necessary safety services to the community was very solid and they appear to appreciate the various programs/services that the agency provides.

### **Services**

The department was active in 2009 in community relations and crime prevention efforts. Different officers provided such services as bank presentations and safety talks to school children. The Beachwood Police Senior Academy was conducted. Our agency hosted an OVI update training seminar and a monthly meeting for Safe Kids/Safe Communities Coalition/SRADD. Ptl. Martin attended an informational booth at the Greater Cleveland Auto Show where he provided information on seat belt use, booster seats and child restraint. He also addressed the dangers of impaired driving.

On September 21, Commander Patrick Sullivan was the keynote speaker at the Triple A East-Central Annual Award Banquet and Meeting. He discussed our agency's reporting of yearly activities. Also, the department received the Platinum award for Community Traffic Safety practices. The department was one of seven cities from ten counties to receive this award.

The department provides a variety of programs such as Safety Town and home and business security surveys. The current programs and activities provided by our department can be useful and should continue.

### **Concerns**

Complaints/Reports on traffic violations at different locations were a regular concern during the year. Uniform officers were advised to provide traffic details to address these complaints and the speed trailer was deployed at different locations to help inform motorists of their speeds. Also, officers were encouraged to provide informational pamphlets to young drivers they come in contact with through traffic stops. Available brochures addressed speed, road rage, yielding to emergency vehicles and impaired driving.

Safe bike riding on the paths shared by pedestrians in the city park had been a concern. Officers provided foot patrols in the park and the speed trailer had been placed in the park for a short period to alert bicyclists of their speeds.

Also, complaints of garbage being left out prior to authorized pickup times and noise complaints involving commercial trucks had been concerns and were addressed by personnel.

### **Summary on crime**

A review of incidents from 2008 to 2009 indicated a general increase in burglary/breaking and entering complaints. The department responded to this problem in a variety of measures such as through preventive patrol with special attention to affected areas, follow-up investigation, fourth platoon surveillance assignments and disseminating intelligence to personnel. Department efforts also included arrests of burglars and the identification of a suspect.

Overall, thefts complaints were up from the prior year. Similar efforts were made to address this criminal activity. Domestic violence and family offense complaints increased in 2009. Incidents overall in 2009 were similar to those in 2008 with some fluctuations.

### **Suggestions**

Some of the respondents to the citizen survey suggested officers get to know citizens and others suggested more community involvement. It was recommended that officers conduct more foot patrols, use CPI cards more, provide safety literature when applicable, address children safety issues such as wearing a bike helmet and engage in friendly interactions.

### **STUDENTS AGAINST DESTRUCTIVE DECISIONS (S.A.D.D.)**

The Beachwood Police Department Juvenile Division organized and is co-sponsor of the Beachwood High School Students Against Destructive Decisions Program. This year S.A.D.D. totaled 16 members. This is a significant drop from several years ago as we made the entrance

requirements stricter and its members more accountable. We hosted several school assemblies throughout the year pertaining to health and welfare issues to promote making the right choices in life.

In 2009, the Beachwood Police and Fire Department presented our annual “MOCK CRASH” exercise before the entire Beachwood High School student body. We also conducted several drinking and driving assemblies as well as classroom discussion sessions throughout the year.

Students, teachers and parents seem to appreciate the efforts this department and the S.A.D.D. program attempts to project and we feel the program augments our drug and alcohol stance of no tolerance within the school and our community.

### **THE SENIOR CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY**

The Senior Citizen Police Academy was conducted again in 2009 making this the 12th year the program has been in existence. A record 35 persons received crime prevention training and graduation certificates. There have been over two hundred resident graduates since its inception.

The Senior Citizen Academy is a crime prevention/informational program designed to meet the needs and interests of the senior citizen. It also gives the attendee an overview of how the Beachwood Police Department accomplishes policing our community. The personal relationships that we have garnered through this program have been invaluable to this department and its members.

### **THE SELF-DEFENSE and AWARENESS PROGRAM**

The Police Department Self-Defense and Awareness Program is a community policing/crime prevention program that provides valuable self-defense and safety awareness training. It is presented by Beachwood police officers and is available to resident groups, civic organizations and corporations within the City of Beachwood. An instructor provided a block of self-defense and awareness training to members of the Senior Academy.

### **EDUCATIONAL CHILDREN ONLINE PROTECTION PROGRAM (E-COPP)**

The e-Copp program (educational children’s online protection program) is a community policing educational tool instructing children and adults on the dangers and proper uses of the Internet. The program is available for any interested group, organization, or individual. It is the goal of e-Copp to prevent Internet victimization through education. Children who experience e-Copp gain valuable insight into fun and productive uses of the Internet as well as those things about surfing online, email, chat rooms, and instant messaging that can present a danger to unsuspecting or naïve children. The children are provided handouts to share with

their parents including a "Safe Surfing" contract that allows the child to positively interact with their parents regarding Internet issues in their home.

During 2009, there were no Internet safety presentations requested. The Beachwood Police staffed a police display table at the Beachwood Chamber of Commerce annual pancake breakfast during 2009. The police materials on display focused on community policing and Internet safety. In December of 2009, a request by Agnon School was made to have e-Copp presented to the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades during February of 2010.






















