

# **ACCREDITATION REPORT**



During 2012, the Beachwood Police Department continued the work to retain our accredited status through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (C.A.L.E.A.). C.A.L.E.A., an international organization comprised of law enforcement officials and professionals, has designated a list of over four-hundred fifty standards that they recommend be followed by law enforcement agencies. The standards are constantly reviewed by the commission and are considered the best professional practices for law enforcement.

The past year proved to be difficult due to employee manpower issues. The accreditation manager was reassigned to other duties limiting her time on the oversight of the accreditation process. As we prepared to begin dispatching for the City of Pepper Pike, much time was spent assigned to dispatch or assisting the dispatch supervisor.

During 2012, new policies were released and existing policies were revised. Some of these revisions were due to modifications to C.A.L.E.A. standards, although the majority was due to changes in our procedures and changes in federal, state and local laws.

Although our goal has been to attend State of Ohio Accreditation Resource (S.O.A.R.) meetings throughout the year, we were unable to meet this goal during 2012. However, the accreditation manager did attend a C.A.L.E.A. conference in March in Mobile, Alabama. The conferences offer informative workshops and provide a means to speak with other law enforcement agencies on various accreditation related topics. This conference was exceptionally beneficial as there have been a number of changes to C.A.L.E.A. programs.

In October the department had its mock assessment to prepare for the actual C.A.L.E.A. assessment in March of 2013. During the two day mock assessment, two accreditation managers and one C.A.L.E.A. assessor from other departments volunteered their time to review the files that had been compiled and offered numerous suggestions for proving compliance. They were also able to provide more information on the options available to us with the new C.A.L.E.A. processes and their guidance was most helpful.

In November, the accreditation manager assisted CMHA with their mock assessment. This proved to be beneficial for our department as well as it provides the opportunity to sit with other accreditation managers and/or assessors and discuss the best options for proving and documenting compliance with C.A.L.E.A. standards.

After several years of working under C.A.L.E.A. guidelines, accreditation has proved to be beneficial to the Beachwood Police Department. As part of the process, the department's

policies and procedures have been updated and continue to be reviewed annually with the goal of not only complying with C.A.L.E.A. standards, but to improve all aspects of the police department and most importantly, the service it delivers to the citizens of Beachwood. The progress that has been made through this process and the attainment of an accredited status is a direct reflection on the dedication and professionalism of all members of the Beachwood Police Department.

## **TECHNOLOGY REPORT**

The Beachwood Police Department continues to maintain its current technology and seeking advancements when appropriate.

The police department was required by the end of 2012 to narrowband our police radio frequencies by the FCC. In 2010, we completed the station and dispatch upgrades. In 2011, we completed all mobile radio upgrades. In 2012, we completed the upgrade with new portable radios and final programming, and test the entire system.

In 2011 we started a significant computer / server upgrade. In 2012 we completed the server virtualization and virtualized all servers that could be virtualized. Some systems could not be virtualized due to unique or specialty hardware requirements, such as the phone and radio recording server. Last year we started the desktop replacement that will be completed in 2013.

## **DISPATCH REPORT**

The year 2012 brought a great deal of change within the dispatch center. In March of 2012, the responsibility of the day to day supervision of the dispatch center was reassigned from Lt. Gary Haba to Darrel Dunham.

On May 1, 2012, the dispatch center successfully began the implementation of early shifts inside of dispatch. Dispatch would now have one dispatcher start one (1) hour earlier than the normal shift times. Due to the increased call volume and the fact that two (2) uniform patrol officers were always working on the road it made sense to constantly maintain dispatch capabilities. The benefits of this new program were realized almost immediately making the transition from shift to shift seamless along with the increased communication between the shifts.

Effective July 23, 2012, dispatch also began dispatching for the City of Pepper Pike's Police and Fire Departments. With the addition of Pepper Pike and the anticipated increase in workload, three (3) new dispatchers were hired. The minimum manpower on the day and afternoon shifts were also increased from two (2) dispatchers to three (3). Night shift staffing remained unchanged. The additional manpower has allowed the dispatch center to run more efficiently. There is now a greater ability to spread the workload more evenly among dispatchers that are working the shift. The quality of work has not diminished and we have been able to continue working to a high standard.

In addition to the above changes many physical improvements were also made inside of dispatch which is outlined below:

- The third dispatch position received some minor upgrades to the phones system and the layout of the CAD monitors in an effort to replicate the other two dispatch stations.
- The jail inmate information board was improved as well as a new dry erase board was hung for dispatch operations.
- New mailboxes for dispatch personnel were installed inside of dispatch and all non-dispatch mailboxes were moved into the records room.
- A large file cabinet was installed inside of dispatch to better organize warrant files.
- A new microwave oven and coffee maker replaced old nonfunctioning equipment.
- The carpeting inside of the dispatch center was replaced and the walls were repainted.
- Dispatcher uniforms were upgraded with new dark blue polo style shirts with a silver “dispatcher” badge embroidered on the front.

There has been a high level of cooperation between all of the dispatchers during this year of transition and the success of the unit is a direct result of this cooperation. We are anticipating additional changes for the coming year to include upgrading our CAD/RMS system and eventual equipment upgrades inside of the dispatch center.

### **TRAFFIC SAFETY ENFORCEMENT ANNUAL REVIEW**

The purpose of this report is to review our traffic safety enforcement activity to determine if our enforcement activities are directed to the areas where there are traffic complaints, crash activity or random safety enforcement. This report is broad based and will review various aspects of traffic conditions throughout the City of Beachwood.

## **CRASH ACTIVITY**

In 2012 there were 983 motor vehicle accidents reported to the Beachwood Police. Of this total, 284 occurred on private property. These accidents usually involve minor damage to the vehicles and were self-reported by the participants. There were 114 accidents that occurred on public roadways where the parties involved went to the police station and filled out the accident report themselves, with no further police involvement. These accidents are usually of a minor nature and the individuals involved did not feel it was a matter worth reporting to the police at the time of occurrence. At a later time, for insurance or other purposes, it was decided that a report should be filed.

Due to the limited enforcement options and the limited input to the design features of private property, statistics from private property are not used in the following comparison statistics. The accidents that occurred on the public roadways and were self-reported are not included in the comparisons as there is no official verification as to the validity of the report.

There were a total of 585 on street accidents investigated by the Beachwood Police Department in 2012. Of the 585 on street accidents 175 or 30 percent involved personal injury, with 258 people involved claiming some type of injury.

## **FATAL CRASHES**

In 2012, there were no fatal crashes in the City of Beachwood.

## **PEDESTRIAN INVOLVED CRASHES**

There were four accidents involving pedestrians within the public right of way. All the persons involved were adults. They all occurred during daylight hours on week days. Two of the accidents took place at the intersection of Chagrin and Park East. One pedestrian was running across Chagrin while Chagrin vehicle traffic had a green traffic signal and was struck by a vehicle. The other pedestrian stepped off the sidewalk quickly in front of a vehicle and was pushed to the ground. Both pedestrians received non-incapacitating injuries and were transported to a hospital. No traffic tickets were issued in either accident.

The other two accidents took place on Cedar, one at George Zeiger, the other at the driveway to the Cleveland Clinic (26900 Cedar). The drivers were intending to turn right onto Cedar and were looking to the left at oncoming traffic. When vehicle traffic permitted them to turn right, the drivers failed to yield to the pedestrians either on the sidewalk or within the crosswalk. The pedestrians received non-incapacitating injuries and were transported to a hospital. Both drivers were cited for causing the accidents.

## **CAUSATIVE FACTORS AND ENFORCEMENT**

When looking at causative factors, failure to maintain an assured clear distance ahead was listed as the causative factor in 341 crashes. In 2012, 330 drivers were issued citations for Failure to Maintain an Assured Clear Distance Ahead. In many cases, speed can be directly attributed to this type of crash. However, the continuing trend is an increase in cell phone use, i.e. calling, texting, e-mails etc. and it is our opinion that many of these crashes are directly related to driver inattention and or failure to maintain full time and attention to the operation of the motor vehicle. In mid-2012 Beachwood City Council passed an ordinance that took effect in August banning the “use of electronic wireless communications devices while driving.” There were 73 violators cited for the “cell phone ordinance” and hundreds given verbal and written warnings as there was a thirty day grace period when enacted. This ordinance is a primary offense and carries a two point penalty.

There were 863 citations issued for various speed violations.

Failure to Yield was listed as the causative factor on 56 crash reports. The Ohio OH-1 report does not differentiate between the various “failure to yield” violations. A review of our enforcement activity revealed the following:

- 27 citations issued for Failure to Yield while turning left
- 28 citations issued for Failure to Yield from a private drive
- 123 citations issued for Failure to Yield at a stop or yield sign
- 2 citations issued for Failure to Yield to an emergency vehicle

Improper lane change was listed as the causative factor on 57 reports; 84 citations were issued. Failure to control was listed as the causative factor on 39 reports; 44 citations were issued. Red light violation was listed as the causative factor on 13 reports; 125 citations were issued. Improper backing was listed as the causative factor on 8 reports; 16 citations were issued.

## **HIGH ACCIDENT LOCATIONS**

Overall crash activity on Chagrin Blvd. remained steady, with an increase of only one accident over 2011. Most of the reported crashes were assured clear distance violations (57%) or failure to yield violations (11%). A total of 633 traffic stops were made on Chagrin Blvd. with 197 citations being issued to violators.

Crash activity on Richmond Road showed a slight increase of 9.4%. A total of 389 citations were issued to violators on Richmond Road where 1151 traffic stops took place. It is believed that development in the Harvard Road area has increased the number of vehicles using Richmond Road. Also, commuters have learned that Richmond Road is a viable alternative for Interstate 271 during inclement weather / traffic backups. This will be a focus area in the next few years.

Crash activity on Cedar Road showed a minor decrease of 13 reported crashes (down 11%). There were 341 traffic stops on Cedar Road resulting in 127 citations issued to violators on Cedar Road for various traffic offenses. Crashes are consistent on Cedar Road but totals are rather high considering only the eastbound lanes are in Beachwood. The eastbound lanes direct traffic to I-271 but after the change in the configuration of the on-ramp by the Ohio Department of Transportation (against Beachwood's recommendation) some eight years ago, the flow of traffic is less efficient and more "stop & go" resulting in more accidents. There is not much that can be done enforcement wise on Cedar Road during the evening rush as it would only cause more problems.

## **INTERSECTION ACTIVITY**

1. Park East Road and Chagrin Blvd.: This location revealed a slight decrease in crash activity, for a total of 8 overall.
2. Chagrin Blvd. and Richmond Road: Showed a decrease of reports for a total of 8 overall. This is quite amazing considering the size and volume of the intersection.

## **INTERSTATE I-271**

The following crash activity occurred on I-271 northbound, southbound and includes all exit and entrance ramps:

1. On I-271 northbound, 4 crashes were reported.
2. On I-271 northbound exit to Chagrin Blvd., 9 crashes were reported.
3. On I-271 northbound express lanes, 0 crashes were reported.
4. On I-271 southbound, 38 crashes were reported.
5. On I-271 southbound entrance ramp from Cedar Road, 3 crashes were reported.
6. On I-271 southbound exit ramp to Chagrin Blvd., 15 crashes were reported.
7. On I-271 southbound exit ramp to Harvard Road, 4 crashes were reported.
8. On I-271 southbound express lanes, 8 crashes were reported.

Assured clear distance was the most frequently listed causative factor in these crashes (48%) followed by failure to control (16%). Many of these crashes are a direct result of speed that was excessive for the conditions and driver inattention. Overall, 383 traffic stops were made on the interstate and 167 citations were issued for various traffic violations. We should maintain our high profile enforcement in this area.

## **TRAFFIC COMPLAINTS**

The Beachwood Police Department receives some type of traffic complaint or concern from a motorist almost every day. The complaints range from suspected intoxicated drivers to a simple complaint of debris on the roadway.

When a traffic complaint is received our response is usually one of a few options. If the complaint is about a missing traffic sign or malfunctioning traffic signal, the traffic bureau will coordinate the adjustment, replacement or repair. Many times the complainant simply has a question that may need to be answered.

If the complaint involves motorists not obeying some type of traffic law, a police unit is dispatched and the complaint is also reviewed by the traffic bureau for further police response. After review, a special attention notice is usually posted and officers direct their discretionary enforcement time to the problem area.

In 2012, the police department received 535 traffic complaints (as defined above) called into dispatch. The number of complaints does not necessarily reflect the true total, as there are times where calls are directed to the traffic bureau, individuals speak directly to officers on the road, or complaints are sometimes relayed by other means such as email.

Applicable complaints were posted in a “traffic special attention” file and via email where all personnel can access, including those in patrol cars. In response, officers either give the area special attention by frequently patrolling the area (the most common), or they may set up on a traffic detail targeting the violation(s) that are the subject of the complaint for lengthier periods of time. In 2012, officers logged traffic details for speed 325 times, reckless operation 31 times, OVI offenses 23 times, stop sign offenses 146 times, and traffic signal violations 8 times. There were also 178 “misc.” traffic details.

Problem areas in 2012 were similar to those in previous years. Speed complaints on Sulgrave, Hilltop, Halburton and Bryden as well as stop sign complaints on Halcyon and on Village Lane were some of the more regular complaints. Blocking the intersection on Richmond at Bryden was again a source of a lot of calls.

The number of complaints / calls regarding the Bryden area increased in the second half of the year as a driveway exiting Signature Square’s parking lot was put in by the owner. Concerns were that drivers exiting would make a u-turn out of the drive into the residential area. The traffic bureau had the service department install lane delineators at the end of the driveway which “prevents” u-turn movements.

## **SPEED AWARENESS TRAILER / TRAFFIC INFORMATION SIGN**

The Speed Awareness Trailer was deployed throughout the city during the summer months. The trailer was placed in various locations based on complaints or officer observations. The unit was moved around the city to over nine different locations, as well as moving the trailer on the same street in different areas. The trailer was used between May and late September, and was stored during the winter months.

The portable traffic information sign was deployed throughout the city during the warmer weather months. The sign, which is trailer mounted, was placed in only a few locations for

differing reasons, mostly advising of construction, detours, delays, warnings on violations, and race events. The unit was deployed for most of the summer in the area of Richmond Road and Fairmount Boulevard due to construction. The sign is stored for the winter to prevent damage.

## **OVI ARRESTS AND ENFORCEMENT**

In 2012 the Beachwood Police Department made forty-one (41) arrests for persons who were Operating a Vehicle while Under the Influence of alcohol and/or drugs (O.V.I.) or Physical Control of a Motor Vehicle while Under the Influence. Two of these arrests were for Physical Control of a Motor Vehicle while Under the Influence. Of those arrested, twenty-six (26) were male and twenty (15) were female. There were no juvenile OVI arrests the last three years.

Seventeen (17) of the arrested persons submitted to a breath sample with the average Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) level being .186, which is over twice the legal limit of .08. The high reading was .399, which is over four (4X) times the legal limit. Fourteen (14) persons refused to provide a sample. There had been a steady decline in the percentage of refusals in recent years going from 37% in 2007 to 31% 2010, however in 2011 the percentage spiked to 45%. In 2012 the percentage eased back to 34%.

Due to exigent circumstances, ten (10) persons were requested to provide blood samples. One of those persons refused to submit to the test. Seven (7) were found to be impaired. Two (2) results are still pending.

Seven (7) of the violators had at least one (1) prior conviction with two (2) having two (2) or more priors. .

There were eight (8) traffic crash related O.V.I's in 2012.

The bulk of O.V.I. arrests were made between 2300 hours and 0400 hours (71%) with another 15% between 1600 and 2300. The busiest days of the week for O.V.I. activity were again late Saturday night and early Sunday morning which is a regular trend. The busiest month of the year was August with 6 O.V.I. arrests made. The location with the highest number arrests was Interstate 271 followed by Chagrin Blvd. - with 27% and 22% respectively. Richmond Road was third with 17%.

All O.V.I. cases are adjudicated in the Shaker Hts. Municipal Court with the exception of juvenile O.V.I. cases which are handled through Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court and felony O.V.I. situations which are handled in Cuyahoga County Courts.

Over the last several years, results from the O.V.I. analysis were distributed to the patrol division for O.V.I. details, specifically targeting areas and times where statistically we've made the most arrests. This allows for more concentrated enforcement as opposed to regular patrol where officers patrol all areas and respond to calls.

## **OVERALL TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT**

Officers made over 4,200 traffic stops in 2012 that resulted in one of the following: citation issued, written warning, verbal warning, or arrest. There were 863 speeding citations issued, 125 traffic signal citations, 472 vehicle registration violations, 123 stop sign violations, and 168 motorists cited for driving under suspension. Officers issued 661 written warnings and over 1,600 verbal warnings.

Overall, our traffic enforcement program is on target with our intentions to direct our focus on specific problem areas but not at the expense of other areas. We should maintain our consistent level of enforcement along our major streets and highways. We will continue to direct our discretionary enforcement time to the areas where complaints have been received but not at the expense of ignoring other criminal activity trends. For example we would like to increase our number of OVI detail units on weekends, however we have seen an increase in commercial burglaries over the weekends and we need to balance our directed patrol efforts and still cover regular calls for service.

In mid-2012, the City of Beachwood passed a “Use of Electronic Communications Device While Driving” ordinance. This ordinance prohibits hand held use of cell phones / electronic devices while driving. This is a primary two point offense and was introduced with a 30 day grace period. There were hundreds of warnings given and 73 citations issued. We believe many of the “assured clear distance” citations we write are due to distracted driving and this gives us a tool to address that.

When reviewing the traffic details that are logged in areas where we get complaints, oftentimes the officer spends 20-30 minutes and logs “no violations observed.” The fact that a marked police cruiser / SUV is in the area is a deterrent to the violations that result in complaints, but yields less enforcement. The use of motorcycles helps that cause.

## **ENGINEERING**

The Chagrin Boulevard ITS project was completed in 2012. All ten signals were put into operation and the new central system called Centracs was installed in the Police Department and is operational. Perram Electric, the installer, continued to service the system if problems occurred. Pathmaster has provided training and support for the new system.

Richmond Road had a large portion replaced in 2012. The roadway was totally replaced from just north of Hendon though Fairmount and ending at Fire Station One’s driveway. The old concrete roadway was removed and new concrete was poured. Traffic was limited to one lane for northbound and southbound Richmond. Fairmount traffic was detoured around the construction project. The traffic signal at Richmond and Fairmount was turned off. The roadway was widened starting at Hendon and going north to lengthen the northbound left turn lane for vehicles turning onto Fairmount westbound. The additional length of the left turn lane

was put in for safety reasons. Prior to the construction vehicles wanting to turn left onto Fairmount would routinely go left of the solid yellow double lines, into oncoming traffic, to get around other northbound vehicles that were going straight through the intersection. With the additional length of the left turn lane vehicles no longer have to go left of center to get into the left turn lane. Also for safety reasons the approaches and departures of Fairmount through the intersection were leveled to remove “dips” in the roadway.

Negotiations between officials from the City of Warrensville, Village of Highland Hills, Tri-C College, and City of Beachwood were finalized and a new traffic signal was installed at the Tri-C entrance on Richmond Road south of Harvard Road. The traffic signal is owned and serviced by Warrensville Heights. The signal is connected to the Harvard Road system that is controlled by Beachwood. Beachwood may change the programming to this signal in order to move traffic through the area more efficiently but must notify Warrensville and Highland Hills of the changes.

Cuyahoga County Engineers performed a mostly rehabilitation project on South Green Road between Chagrin and Fairmount. There were no widening or other major changes done. The old asphalt was ground down, new curbs and driveway aprons were poured with concrete, then new asphalt was put down on the roadway. Traffic was limited to one lane for northbound only. Vehicles wanting to travel southbound on S. Green Road through the construction zone were detoured around the area. As part of the project the traffic signal at the intersection of S. Green and Halburton was completely replaced. The old mechanical controller and signals were replaced with a new signal system that has the same specifications as the new Chagrin system. This new signal will be connected to the Chagrin traffic signal system. Officers will then be able to adjust the timing of the signal to provide a safer and more efficient flow of traffic through the intersection.

The City of Beachwood performed a road construction project on S. Woodland between Richmond and Sulgrave. The asphalt roadway and stone curbs were ground down to provide a solid base. Concrete was then poured onto the base with a machine forming and leveling the concrete to make the new roadway and curbs. This type of construction is called “White Topping” and was the first time used within the City of Beachwood.

## **TOWED VEHICLES ANNUAL REPORT**

In 2012, the Traffic Bureau managed the Beachwood Police Department vehicle towing operation. This operation includes overseeing the towing and impounding of vehicles seized during the routine performance of police duties and the disposal of all unclaimed vehicles in accordance with state law. Complete records of all vehicles towed and their disposition are maintained.

In 2012 the Beachwood Police Department contracted with three tow companies to provide towing services. The companies were Interstate Towing, Mooney’s Towing, and Rich’s Towing. Police dispatchers used a rotation system to ensure that each company gets an

equitable share of the police tows. Exceptions to this rotation are if a tow company either cannot respond at the time requested or cannot respond with specific requested equipment such as a flatbed or dolly. Interstate Towing and Rich's Towing are equipped to handle large tows of semi's and heavy equipment. Tow companies were authorized to charge \$125 for a standard tow (additional fees for extra labor, i.e. use of a dolly, winch-outs, etc.) and \$15 per day for storage.

In 2012 there were 537 vehicles towed, this includes 140 private tows. Private tows are those that the Police may have called for at the request of the driver but no further Police action was taken. Of the vehicles towed, 19 were unclaimed and scrapped.

## **TRAFFIC SIGNAL REPORT**

The Beachwood Police Traffic Bureau is assigned the task of monitoring and maintaining the four closed loop traffic systems and forty (40) traffic signals owned by the City of Beachwood. The monitoring of traffic signals is done on a daily basis by a central traffic computer located in the Traffic Bureau. Officers also observe the traffic systems while on patrol to make sure that the signals are working properly.

While officers do not repair the traffic signals, they are usually the first person to realize there is a problem with a traffic signal. When a hardware problem is detected the Beachwood Police call the Signal Service Company in Warrensville Heights. Signal Service responded to 114 repair calls for the City of Beachwood in 2012, a significant reduction from previous years. This was due in part that the Chagrin ITS system was under ODOT's control and all repairs had to be done by the project contractor. The other reason for fewer repairs was due to the ongoing replacement of incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs. Due to the much longer life span of LED bulbs, not as many bulb replacement repairs were made in 2012.

The cost of all repairs was approximately \$65,000.00. While there was a reduction in the cost from previous years it is not proportionate to the number of repairs from previous years. The reason for this is because we were changing numerous signals over to LED bulbs at a time and reducing the overall labor cost. At the end of 2012 there was only one City of Beachwood traffic signal that had not been converted over to LED bulbs. It is expected to be converted in early 2013.

The Chagrin ITS system was completed in 2012. The system allows officers to view traffic in real time within the traffic bureau office. Officers can detect problems and make changes to the traffic controllers to provide safe and efficient movement of traffic through the system.

Topics covered during Safety town included:


- How to properly cross the street
- School Bus safety
- Police Officer day
- Bike safety day
- Firefighter day
- Stranger safety
- Poison safety
- Home safety
- Playground safety

There was also a field trip to Beachwood Fire Station #1 and the Beachwood Police Station. A graduation ceremony was held on the final day in the Board of Education board room.

The University Hospitals Safe Kids Street Team presented a block on poison safety for the second year. A great job was done by Nakeshia. The children really enjoyed the presentation.



The city functioned well. There was a collaborative effort from the Police Department, the Recreation Department, the Service Department and the School Board.



The Safety Town cars are getting a little older and needed some minor repairs. A few of the cars still need minor repairs to the pedals and chains. The Beachwood Recreation Department purchased three new pedal cars in 2010 that were put to use. The newer cars appear easier to operate for the children.

Safety Town was painted prior to the start of classes in 2011. It did not need repainting this year however, it WILL need to be painted again prior to the 2013 classes.

The Safety Town traffic signal is very old and heavy. The old damaged light shrouds on the signal were taken off and reshaped and cleaned prior to Safety Town. **The traffic signal needs to be replaced** and hopefully will be prior to the 2013 session as parts were set aside. A newer light weight plastic signal is preferred. The light regularly gives a RED and GREEN signal on the same side, while still giving a red or green to the other. The signals need to be cycled through to stop the problem. Due to the age of the mechanical controller inside the signal unit, additional repair issues can be expected.

The classes went very well. Many parents and family members thanked all of the teachers for their hard work. The student counselors also did a fantastic job with the children.

In conclusion, the 2012 Safety Town program was again a great success. Students, family and friends were all very thankful and impressed with the quality of the program.

Safety Town was very well run and once again can be considered one of the most popular programs offered by the city.

# **INVESTIGATIVE UNITS REPORT**

## **DETECTIVE BUREAU**

In 2012 the members of the Detective Bureau investigated 256 cases, including 134 juvenile related incidents. This represents a slight increase over 2011. These cases encompassed a wide range of reported criminal activity to include financial crimes, thefts, sexual assaults and burglaries. All detectives are trained and experienced in investigating various types of cases and cases were assigned based on a Detective's case load at the time of the report. Major incidents were investigated through a collaborative effort between the Patrol Division and a team of Detectives.

One Detective handled the majority of the juvenile filings and investigations. This included managing and overseeing the Juvenile Diversion Program. The Detective who was assigned to handle the juvenile cases for the past several years retired this year and the responsibility was transferred to another member of the Detective Bureau.

The Patrol Division conducted the preliminary follow up on most minor cases, which has several benefits. It helps the Patrol Officers understand what information is needed when taking an initial report, it develops the patrol officer's investigative skills and it reduces the number of cases that need to be followed up by the Detective Bureau.

## **INTERNAL AFFAIRS**

In 2012 fifteen incidents were investigated as Internal Affairs complaints. Of those fifteen incidents, fourteen were external complaints and one was an internal complaint. The disposition of the fourteen external complaints was as follows: eight were unfounded, five were classified as Inquiries and two were sustained.

## **JUVENILE DIVISION**

The Beachwood Juvenile Division underwent notable changes in 2012 with the retirement of long-standing Juvenile Detective Donn Breckenridge in May of that year. The following is a summary of investigation casework completed by Det Breckenridge, and his replacement for the year, Det McFadden:

The Juvenile Division investigated 134 cases that resulted in 130 juvenile arrests in 2012. 126 of those arrests were misdemeanor level and 4 were felony level. 5 of those arrests resulted in transport and incarceration at the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Detention facility.

There were 3 Domestic Violence related juvenile arrests.  
There were 5 Traffic related juvenile arrests.  
There were 8 Drug and/or Alcohol related juvenile arrests.  
There were 16 curfew arrests.  
There were 105 Theft related juvenile arrests.

36 of the 130 juvenile arrests were handled as first offender Beachwood Juvenile Diversion Program cases, in lieu of forwarding charges to the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court. The rest were filed with that court for adjudication, to include County-sponsored diversion programs, Drug Court programs, Traffic Court programs, and Criminal Court proceedings.

The above numbers indicate a general decrease in juvenile offenses from the year 2011 (130 arrests vs. 203); an encouraging trend. Theft offenses, and more specifically, shopliftings, remain the largest criminal problem involving juveniles in Beachwood. The Beachwood Place Mall stores: Sephora, H & M, Dillard's and Claire's Boutique emerged as the most-targeted by such offenders. These statistics might also reflect that the aforementioned stores aggressively pursue shoplifting crimes through their Loss Prevention programs. Many of these stores have initiated post-offense civil actions against the juvenile's parents by issuing letters of demand for time and merchandise reimbursement.

Det McFadden has met with and discussed current juvenile criminal procedures with Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court administrators Angela Ortiz (Senior Intake and Diversion Officer) and Judith Headland (Criminal Complaints Administrator) since taking over the Beachwood PD Juvenile Division. Beachwood will remain one of the departments in the Cuyahoga County system that submits casework by mail, due to compatibility problems with the Beachwood RMS system and the County Juvenile Court web portal. This is perfectly acceptable to the County Juvenile Intake staff. As always, the County Juvenile Court requires, at minimum, the following submission documents in each case filing:

- Cuyahoga County Juvenile Fact sheet for each juvenile offender
- Complete Beachwood Police report with booking information
- Photocopies of related written statements
- Printed photographs of stolen merchandise and other pertinent items
- Victim Precipe (if more than one individual or business victim is involved).

Det McFadden requested the necessary training to utilize the County's "iCase" Juvenile Records system. He can now, through this system, access prior case, personal data, and family data information about the juvenile arrestees.

## **JUVENILE DIVERSION PROGRAM**

The Beachwood Police Department Diversion Program has been continued in the absence of Det Breckenridge. 36 juvenile arrestees have been allowed in 2012, to complete this first-

offender program which is administrated within the Beachwood Police Department by the juvenile detective.

Not all arrestees qualify. Candidates for diversion must have no reported prior criminal history within the Cuyahoga County (or neighboring) juvenile justice system. They must have exhibited full cooperation with loss prevention and police authorities during their apprehension and arrest investigation. Only single, misdemeanor, non-violent, non-drug/alcohol criminal action cases are considered. Offenders and their parents/guardians must affirm their interest and willingness to complete the program in a timely manner and according to the detective's instructions. A five-page essay about their criminal actions must be completed satisfactorily within an allowed time period. Eight hours of community service must then be accomplished to satisfy the program requirements. This community service is now accomplished within the offender's locale at facilities acceptable to the parent/guardian, juvenile offender, and juvenile detective on a case by case basis. In 2012, local churches, nursing homes, hospitals, food centers, and community outreach agencies within the Cleveland area have benefitted from the offenders' time and efforts. The change in venue to the offender's own neighborhood has eased transportation issues uncovered in past diversions and fostered a sense of community pride and involvement within the juvenile offender participants. The cases are filed within the Beachwood Police Department at the conclusion of the diversion program and charges are not forwarded to the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court. Since no record of the offense is readily available to other departments after the completion of a Beachwood diversion, candidates are chosen to fit standards of low repeat-offense likelihood.

## **CASES OF INTEREST**

1210212 – A shoplifting arrest was submitted in the early part of 2012 against a juvenile female. The County Juvenile Intake staff advised that the female had provided booking officers with fictitious personal information to avoid prosecution. The juvenile's true information was tracked down and the case was re-filed. The adult female who picked up the juvenile from booking was charged with Obstructing Justice.

1248421 – Beachwood Police investigated a case of Gross Sexual Imposition on 12/31/12, involving a 9 year old female victim and her mother's adult boyfriend.

## **FUTURE GOALS**

Juvenile bookings have proven to be problematic in a few areas. Unlike adults who generally carry identification cards and verifiable data within their background records, juveniles are often not in the system. It has become more important to cross-check the parent/guardian, address, school, or other related personal data to ensure correct identification during bookings. Prior arrest records are inaccessible without such accuracy.

Juvenile bookings are vastly time-consuming. Booking officers must accompany their arrestees until able to turn custody over to parents or guardians. In discussions with Juvenile Intake personnel, elements of the reporting process can be streamlined to fulfill Court requirements. Suggestions included the following:

Photo grouping (of like store merchandise) into one rather than several individual photos.  
Completion of only the necessary data fields within the juvenile booking RMS.

Immediate return of stolen items to the victim retailers (now done).

Clustering price tag data onto single PDF documents.

# **TRAINING REPORT**

## **DEFENSIVE TACTICS**

While on duty, police officers may encounter violent resistance or dangerous assaults against them. The officers may use force to defend themselves and control situations. The Beachwood Police department provides officers with different use of force options to protect and defend others and themselves.

In 2012, training on defending against strikes and double leg takedowns was covered in lesson plan DT-032 and training on ground defenses was addressed in lesson plan DT-33. In lesson plan DT-034, officers received training on the use of disposable Cobra cuffs for restraint purposes. Officers also received training on the agency use of force policy which provides “guidelines to make force decisions in a professional, impartial, and safe manner” (.50 Use of Force policy).

Ptl. Dansizen provided matron training in 2012 to two newly hired dispatchers which included self-defense tactics.

The following are some of the tools available to officers to defend themselves and control situations.

### *Electronic Control Devices*

A Taser strike can cause neuro-muscular incapacitation (NMI) on a person which can help control a violent resisting subject.

### *Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) Aerosol Spray*

OC spray, which is commonly referred to as pepper spray, is a safe and effective police tool to help officers gain control of non-compliant individuals. OC is an inflammatory which is a derivative of cayenne pepper. If applied, it will cause the involuntary closing of the eyes and will impair a person’s breathing. It will also create an intense burning sensation to the exposed areas. When officers are initially trained in the concepts and use of OC spray, they receive exposure to it to allow them to better understand its potential effects and limitations.

### *PR-24 Control Batons*

Department police officers are equipped with PR-24 control batons. The baton is an instrument designed to help officers defend themselves and others against a physical assault and also to help control non-compliant subjects.

### *Protective Equipment / Restraints*

The Beachwood Police department also provides protective equipment for its police officers to protect them from subjects who may try to bite them or spit at them. These tools can also help protect them from infectious diseases from subjects under arrests. They include the Tranzport Hoods and Protection Masks. The department also provides police and correction personnel with additional restraints to help control resisting subjects or arrested persons who are escape risks. These restraints include the RIPP Restraint Hobbles and the Arm and Ankle Restrainers. Officers also have access to Cobra Cuffs and flex cuffs.

# **POLICE USE OF FORCE REPORT**

## **USE OF FORCE REPORT**

During the 2012 year, members of the Beachwood Police Department were involved in three (3) Use of Force incidents. None of these incidents involved the use of deadly force and none involved the use of an impact weapon.

Of the seven incidents; officers use the following force in each:

- deployed a Taser in one situation
- use of arm bar/wrist lock, knee strike and hands in another
- use of a tackle and wrist lock in another

Number of officers involved in each situation

- one situation involved three (3) officers
- two situations involved one officer

The locations of the incidents:

- one occurred in a lounge/party setting
- one occurred at a single family residence
- one occurred in the parking lot of Beachwood Place Mall

Force was used at the following types of calls:

- one was at an assault in which alcohol was being consumed
- one involved a check the welfare/warrant served
- one involved a theft offense investigation

Injuries were incurred in three of the incidents:

- two officers were injured in one of the incidents
- a suspect was injured in each of the three incidents

The injuries to suspects during the use of force by officers were deemed minor, as were the injuries incurred by the officers.

The following is a brief synopsis of the incidents in which officers used force:

July 8, 2012                      Hilton Hotel-3663 Park East Drive                      CR 1222629

An officer was providing uniformed, off-duty security at the Hilton Hotel. A male physically assaulted another male in the lounge area of the hotel. The officer deployed a Taser on the suspect, who was subdued and taken into custody. The arrested male received minor injuries.

November 13, 2012 2408 Allen Blvd. CR 1241714

Officers responded to a private residence to check on the welfare of a teenaged female. The male resident was uncooperative and was found to have an active warrant for his arrest. When officers attempted to take the male into custody, he became resistive and officers used necessary force to take him into custody.

The male sustained minor injuries, as did two of the officers.

November 25, 2012 Beachwood Place Mall-26300 Cedar Road CR 1242398

An officer working a security detail At Beachwood Place Mall responded to the parking lot of Beachwood Place Mall after a male theft suspect fled on foot from the mall. The suspect failed to comply with the officer's commands. Upon a second officer's arrival, that officer tackled the suspect and handcuffed the male suspect. The suspect sustained minor injuries.

In each of the reported Use of Force incidents, the officer's actions were determined to be justified. The officers used only that force that was reasonable for the circumstances. There were no reported complaints of officers using excessive force in any of these incidents. One officer was involved two of the Use of Force incidents.

The number of Use of Force incidents in 2012 was less than half that of 2011. In 2011, there were five incidents in which an officer deployed a Taser, one in which pepper spray was deployed and one incident in which an officer used physical force to resolve a situation. In 2012, an officer deployed a Taser in one incident and officers used physical force in two other incidents. During 2012, one of the Use of Force incidents involved the use of alcohol and/or drugs of abuse.

Members of the Beachwood Police Department receive annual training on the use of force, crisis intervention and cultural diversity, as well as recertification in the use of the Taser, pepper spray and PR-24. This training provides the proper guidelines for officers to follow when confronted with use of force situations.

## **HOT PURSUIT REPORT**

In 2012, there were no pursuits.

## ILLEGAL PROFILING REPORT

*A fundamental right guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States to all who live in this nation is the equal protection under the law. Along with this right to equal protection is the fundamental right to be free from unreasonable searches and seizures by government agents. Citizens are free to walk and drive our streets, highways, and other public places without police interference so long as they obey the law. They also are entitled to be free from crime, and from the depredations of criminals, and to drive and walk our public ways safe from the actions of reckless and careless drivers.*

This law enforcement agency is charged with protecting these rights, for all, regardless of race, color, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, age, physical handicap, religion or other belief system, and/or other classification or group affiliation.

The purpose of the Illegal Profiling policy is to unequivocally state that illegal profiling in law enforcement is totally unacceptable, to provide guidelines for officers to prevent such occurrences, and to protect our officers when they act within the dictates of the law and policy from unwarranted accusations.

It is the policy of this department to patrol in a proactive manner, to aggressively investigate suspicious persons and circumstances, and to actively enforce the motor vehicle laws, while insisting that citizens will only be stopped or detained when there exists reasonable suspicion to believe they have committed, are committing, or are about to commit an infraction of the law or when the situation leads an officer to believe that a person may need some type of assistance.

To that end, members of the Beachwood Police Department receive regular training in:

- Proactive enforcement tactics
- Laws governing search and seizure
- Illegal Profiling – including legal aspects
- Cultural diversity
- Interpersonal communications skills
- Courtesy
- Officer safety

The training programs emphasize the need to respect the rights of all citizens to be free from unreasonable government intrusion or police action. In addition to these training programs, patrol shift supervisors are required to monitor the enforcement activity of their subordinates to verify that officers are conducting themselves within the guidelines of this policy.

In reviewing this policy for compliance with its purpose in 2011, several aspects of officer activity were examined:

Motor vehicle traffic stops-including citations and warnings issued  
Citations issued due to motor vehicle accidents  
Citizen complaints of illegal profiling

In reviewing the officer activity reports it is important to acknowledge the following unique characteristics of the City of Beachwood. The resident population of the city is approximately 12,000 people but the daytime and afternoon population increases to approximately 100,000 people with business and retail activity in the city. It should also be noted that due to the geographic location of our city and the development of the area, Beachwood has four of the top ten busiest intersections in Cuyahoga County with Cedar Road, Chagrin Blvd and Interstate 271 accounting for high volumes of vehicular traffic flow daily.

In 2012, officers issued 2521 citations to motorists. This number includes citations for traffic violations and citations issued for violations that resulted from motor vehicle accidents. There were 98 more citations issued in 2012 than in 2011. Of these citations, fifty-six percent (56%) were issued to motorists identified as being white; thirty percent (30%) were issued to motorists identified as African-American, two percent (2%) to Asian motorists and 2 percent (2%) to motorists identified as “unknown.” These percentages are within the average range of the 2010 U.S. Census Bureau statistics for Cuyahoga County. There were no complaints filed alleging that officers had illegally profiled motorists in 2012.

During 2012, officers issued 661 written warning citations, 111 more than issued in 2011. These citations include warnings that were issued in person to a motorist and citations that were placed on parked motor vehicles. In the case of written warnings, those issued to individuals whose race could be identified indicated that the percentages were also within the averages for the population of Cuyahoga County. No complaint was filed indicating that officers had illegally profiled individuals that had been issued written warnings in 2012.

***Officers of the Beachwood Police Department, within the scope of their authority, are required to obtain all pertinent information whenever direct contact is made with a suspicious or questionable person.***

***The “field inquiry” is based upon the principle that the opportunity to apprehend criminals and to prevent crime increases with the number and frequency of persons interviewed. Field interviews serve the following purposes:***

- Source of information
- Means of identifying suspects
- Means of obtaining suspects or witness
- Crime Prevention

Field contacts occur when an officer initiates contact with an individual. Reasonable suspicion is the key element on which an officer bases his/her decision to conduct a field interview. The

reasonable suspicion is based on either an officer's observations or secondhand information. If the field interview does not meet this requirement, the officer may still seek to talk to the individual while realizing that the person is under no obligation to answer the officer's questions or remain with the officer. The unusual or suspicious actions of people trigger a field interview.

In 2012, officers conducted fifty-eight (58) field contacts, twenty-two less than in 2011. The locations in which the contacts took place included residential and commercial areas, retail establishments, school grounds, religious facilities and on or near the interstate highway. While a majority of the field contacts were made during the hours of midnight and four o'clock in the morning, officers encountered individuals at all hours of the day. The reasons for the contacts include; occupied motor vehicles in parking lots, persons walking in the middle of a roadway, persons in areas closed at that hour of the day, persons walking around a religious facility that was closed and persons that fit the description of suspects involved in criminal activity. A review of the field contacts made by officers in 2012 indicate that the percentages were also within the averages for the population of Cuyahoga County and reveal no indication of illegal profiling leading to the contacts.

After consulting with the Commander of the Detective Bureau and the supervisor of the Fourth Platoon, it was determined that this department had not conducted asset seizure/forfeiture proceedings in 2012.

Upon completing a review of the Illegal Profiling policy and relevant documentation, it is my determination that this department and its members are in compliance with the policy.

## **MAYOR'S COURT REPORT**

Beachwood Mayor's Court processes and hears all uncontested non-serious misdemeanor offenses. If a case is contested, the case is then transferred to the Shaker Heights Municipal Court in Shaker Heights, Ohio. All felony or serious offenses are automatically processed by either Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court, in the case of a felony, or Shaker Heights Municipal Court, in the case of a serious offense.

In 2012, 2470 traffic and 135 criminal cases were filed with the Beachwood Mayor's Court. A total of 444 parking violations were filed with the court.

In 2012, Mayor's Court transferred 128 contested cases to Shaker Heights Municipal Court. There were 513 cases filed directly with Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court, Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, or Shaker Heights Municipal Court.

# **SPECIALTY UNITS REPORT**

## **COMPUTER CRIMES/FORENSIC UNIT**

The Beachwood Police Department has the ability to examine most computers, investigate computer related crimes, and to view and enhance most video within the department. Rather than taking months to have a computer, video tape or file examined by outside agencies, the department has the ability to do it in house.

Currently there are three officers trained to handle such cases. Ptl. Daniel Grein, Inv. John Finucan, and Ptl. Aaron Lieb are trained in processing and enhancing video tapes or files. Ptl. Grein and Ptl. Lieb are also certified by the state of Ohio to process recovered computer data.

In 2012, more than 7 Computer related cases were investigated. The cases are outlined as:

As computer crimes increase and become more sophisticated, the Beachwood Police Department has continued to improve its officer's technology and training in the field of computer examinations.

## **HONOR GUARD**

The Beachwood Police Department Honor Guard consists of five volunteer officers including Lt. Gary Haba, who served in the U.S. Army as a member of the 3<sup>rd</sup> US Infantry "The Old Guard." Stationed at Ft. Myer, Virginia, "The Old Guard" performs various ceremonial duties including funerals at Arlington National Cemetery, retirement and other ceremonies for high-ranking military and government officials, and guarding The Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers.

The honor guard is viewed by the public during special circumstances such as funerals, parades, or other ceremonies. For this reason, the unit's members are equipped with special uniforms, leather gear and footwear to enhance their appearance. The honor guard typically attends funerals for fallen active officers, retired officers, or family members of active officers. An often overlooked mission for the honor guard unit is that of a public relations tool. Many citizens, especially children, acquire a positive view of the police at ceremonial events.

The honor guard unit assisted with a funeral detail in July for former councilman Larry Small and in November, provided a color guard for a Veteran's Day ceremony at the cemetery located at Halburton and Green Roads.

In 2013, honor guard members look forward to taking part in the memorial parade in May and any other services or parades that may occur.

## **FOURTH PLATOON**

The following is an overview of the activities and independent investigations of the fourth platoon for the year 2012. The fourth platoon consists of a supervisor and when scheduling and circumstances permit, uniform police officers are detailed in a plain clothes capacity, to a specific investigation for a length of time that is determined by the crime that is being investigated.

It was a very active year concerning narcotics investigations. The Fourth Platoon conducted over 25 narcotic investigations that resulted in the arrest and/or indictment of 48 individuals as well as the seizure of firearms, illegal drugs and U.S. Currency. Several of these investigations are still active while some have led to the identification of other drug trafficking organizations operating in the area.

The Fourth Platoon assisted the Drug Enforcement Administration with a Title III Investigation which resulted in the dismantling of a multi-state drug trafficking organization. The case concluded with the execution of search warrants as well as numerous arrests.

The Fourth Platoon worked with the Cuyahoga County Impact Unit as well as the Orange Village Police Department to address the possibility of prostitution and/or human trafficking taking place at area hotels. Investigators found no evidence of human trafficking and addressed incidents of prostitution via arrest and/or the issuance of misdemeanor citations.

The Fourth Platoon has a close working relationship with several State and Federal Agencies including the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Ohio State Highway Patrol and the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Office. These relationships have enabled investigators to obtain sensitive information pertaining to illegal activity taking place in the area as well as immediate assistance when necessary.

The Fourth Platoon investigators reached the goals of assisting the detective bureau on several cases and increasing the number of drug trafficking arrests made during the year.

Due to department retirements, promotions and new assignments, staffing of the Fourth Platoon will be handled on an as needed basis. However, the goals of the Fourth Platoon will be to continue to assist the Detective Bureau when needed as well as any assignment given by the Chief of Police. The Fourth Platoon will also continue to work with and provide assistance to other agencies when requested.

## **MOUNTAIN BIKE UNIT**

The police mountain bike unit consists of nine officers who deploy on bicycles on a part-time basis. Mountain bike officers typically mount the bicycles on vehicle racks to allow for them to change modes of patrol quickly during the shift if necessary.

Areas of special attention for bike officers include Beachwood Place Mall, the City Park, the Family Aquatic Center, and Chagrin Blvd. During hours of darkness, bike officers are utilized more in the parking lot areas of the hotels and fuel stations.

In addition to enforcement activities, officers on bicycles are more easily approached by citizens, particularly children. Public relations are an important part of police work and the bicycle unit allows for more exposure and positive citizen contacts than motor vehicle patrol alone. Bicycle officers also assist with traffic and pedestrian control during running races and parades.

Five specially equipped bicycles are used by the unit and feature silent hubs, red/blue lights, Kevlar tires and police markings.

The unit was somewhat active in 2012. Three additional officers were trained and added to the unit in 2012 and the unit will be fully staffed in 2013.

## **RECRUITMENT UNIT ACTIVITY**

The active recruiting campaign began in May 2012 with the formal announcement that a Civil Service test was being offered on October 24, 2012 for the position of full-time police officer. The application period and Civil Service examination were announced in the Cleveland Plain Dealer, Indeed.com, policeone.com, and numerous college on line job boards. Recruiters emailed prospective applicants with the test and application information. The announcement information was also emailed and faxed to Ohio colleges and police academies, as well as police organizations and the NAACP. This contact information is maintained in the 2012 Recruitment list, which is a database used to collect contact information for those interested in a career as a Beachwood Police Officer.

The application period was September 24, – September 29, 2012 and October 1 – October 5, 2012. Inv. Draves and Inv. Budny added late hours on both Wednesdays and morning hours on Saturday, having proven that addition to be successful in 2010. The extra hours were implemented to provide more opportunity for interested parties who may be in school, the police academy or work during normal business hours.

During the application period, 224 applications were distributed. 168 applications were returned. Applicants were once again required to provide a certificate from Tri C, indicating that they passed the physical agility exam. On October 24, 2012, the Police Entrance examination was administered by Patricia Ramsey, of Ramsey and Associates. Inv. Draves

and Inv. Budny assisted. 132 applicants took the examination. Approximately 37 applicants failed the written examination.

The recruitment unit is consistently seeking ways to reach out to the community in an attempt to recruit more minorities. Overall, area police departments have seen a steady decrease in the number of applicants, especially minorities. The addition of the senior project and intern program has proved to be a success, as 3 interns applied to take the entrance examination. Of those college interns, one failed the physical agility and therefore did not take the written exam. The other two interns took the written exam; one passed and one failed. The purpose of the senior project and intern program is to reach out to high school and college students, in an effort to guide and build lasting relationships with those interested in a career with the Beachwood Police Department.

As we have seen in the past, the decrease in the number of applicants as well as the number of individuals who take the examination is partially due to the requirement of a passing score on the Tri C physical agility exam, prior to applying. Once again, the recruiters worked diligently to notify prospective applicants of this requirement, as well as the specific requirements needed to pass the physical agility exam.

Overall, the goals of the 2012 recruitment period were met. Recruiters added the use of social media, such as Twitter and Facebook, with the 2012 campaign. This addition proved to be useful and positive. The recruitment team will continue to search for and pursue additional methods of connecting with minorities in the community.

## **EMERGENCY SERVICES UNIT**

The Beachwood Police Department SWAT team was active in training (9 training sessions) and providing calls for service (11) which included searches and responses for reported barricaded subjects in 2012. They performed well as a team and accomplished objectives.

FF Anthony Kustra, was added to the team as a medic. Team members who are part of the EDGE regional SWAT team continued to train for the activation of this team.

The following were goals for 2012:

- Obtain simunitions equipment for enhanced training.
- Establish rope rescue training for rope rescue team personnel.
- Incorporate negotiators into more SWAT team training and increase their training.
- Update protective equipment if and when feasible.

Some of these goals were met. Simunitions equipment was purchased and negotiators were incorporated into some of the team's training. Holsters were ordered for members and new tactical vests were ordered for three officers.

The objectives for 2013 were to maintain readiness for emergency responses and develop leadership qualities of team members. The goals are the following:

- Continue to practice firearms training from bunker positions.
- Cross train with another SWAT team and/or BPM security personnel or security personnel from a different business, Ahuja hospital or a religious institution.
- Continue leadership training within team members.
- Advanced training for team members to include medics.
- Training exercises with department negotiators.

The following is a synopsis of training and calls for service in 2012.

January 11 Training:

Officers practiced shooting while wearing a Self contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and practiced officer down rescues using the armored vehicle. The PepperBall gun was utilized with inert rounds. Rounds from the PepperBall gun were directed at the armored vehicle to simulate a subject firing rounds at the armored vehicle while it is used to rescue an injured officer. Officers worked with department negotiators on hostage training exercises. Officers did inventory work on the SWAT vehicle.

February 8 Training:

Team members were split in two groups and participated in exercises for the following objectives:

- Officers will work in teams to address a combative subject with a Taser.
- Officers will practice shooting exercises to include the use of the corner weapon.

The exercise on combative subjects involved a paramedic wearing a SIM suit and role playing a subject involved in different types of training scenarios. Depending on the subject's actions, officers made use of force decisions. The Taser using blue training cartridges was deployed for some scenarios. The MRAPS was also used for some of the scenarios.

The range exercises directed by Lt. Winebrenner involved officers practicing shooting from a bunker position, shooting while carrying a bunker and shooting while wearing a gas mask. Officers also practiced shooting the corner gun.

February 15: Mutual aid for drug search warrant

SWAT personnel provided mutual aid in serving a drug search warrant for the University Hts Police Dept. Forced entry was made to the residence and it was secured by team personnel after a search.

April 5: Mutual aid for search warrant

Beachwood Officers responded with the Euclid P.D. SWAT team at 0330 hours to the city of Cleveland for the service of a search warrant. Entry was made into the home and a search was conducted.

May 5: Mutual aid for felony warrant

The Shaker Hts. Police Department requested mutual aid assistance in helping locate a male wanted for a felony domestic violence charge through the Ashtabula County Sheriff's Department. The male was suspected of being at 3333 Warrensville Center Road. It was reported that he may be armed. Members from the Beachwood SWAT team and negotiators responded to that location and SWAT team members began a search for Mr. Pierce. During the search, Mr. Pierce was located and turned over to the Shaker Hts. Police Department.

June 12: Mutual aid for search and arrest warrants

Assisted Euclid SWAT with serving search and arrest warrants on three different locations.

June 12: Mutual aid for search and arrest warrant

Assisted Euclid SWAT serve a Euclid search and arrest warrant.

June 29: Training

SWAT officers and medics and negotiators participated in a joint training drill at the Beachwood Place Mall with Mall security personnel. The training involved a hostage scenario in a hallway on the west side of the mall. Ptl. Acker role played a suspect. Team personnel worked well with BPM security personnel.

After training drill, SWAT officers practiced with the MP-5 using a bunker in the range.

July 30: Mutual aid for a barricaded male

The Shaker Hts. Police Department requested mutual aid assistance for a barricaded male. Inv. Owens responded to the scene as a negotiator. The subject was apprehended prior to members of the team leaving the station.

August 8: Training

Ptl. Calvey and Ptl. Kemer addressed the use of breaching equipment and personnel practiced using the equipment on doors and windows inside 23230 Chagrin Blvd. (office building that will be demolished).

Ptl. Piro addressed the use of distraction devices. Officers then practiced in teams with an officer using a breaching tool to break a window next to a door and then another officer would deploy a distraction device through the opening.

### September 12: Training

Officers practiced control and restraint techniques with handcuffs and Cobra cuffs. Officers worked as a team in use of force scenario exercises.

Officers also practiced officer down drills from a stack. The injured officer would get replaced by another officer and the injured officer would be pulled to safety for medics to treat.

Officers practiced in tabletop logistical exercises. Enlarged photos of an overview of part of East Groveland were used. Officer(s) would be presented with an emergency call and they would explain where officers would respond to and how the call should be directed and coordinated.

### September 13: Mutual aid for a barricaded male

The Shaker Hts. Police Department requested the SWAT team for a barricaded male. An early report advised that the male had a gun but this was later determined to be unfounded. It was also reported that there was an eight year male in the home.

Members of the SWAT team and negotiation team responded to that location. The eight year male was released shortly after Inv. Grisafio who responded first had arrived on scene. Inv. Grisafio was able to persuade the subject to surrender via phone. The male exited the residence and was arrested by members of the SWAT team. The male was turned over to the Shaker Hts. Police Department.

### October 16: Mutual aid for a search and arrest warrant

On October 16, 2012 at approximately 0550 hours, the Beachwood SWAT team assisted the Shaker Hts. Police Department in the service of a search warrant and arrest warrant on Halworth in Beachwood. The SWAT team entered, searched the home and arrested a wanted male. There was a female in the home and five children.

Det. Sgt. Mike Rowe and other members of the Shaker Hts. Police Department took over control of the home to complete the search warrant. The arrested male was placed in the custody of the Shaker Hts. Police Department. The other occupants remained in the home.

During the entry to the home, Ptl. Calvey had to force open two rear doors and there was damage done to both doors. Ptl. Alandt had assisted at the call.

### October 24: Training

Officers completed the annual physical agility test.

Officers practiced using night vision equipment to enter a dark room.

Officers practiced shooting with night vision equipment on in a dark range.

Officers practiced shooting the handgun from a bunker in a low position and then standing up with the bunker, walking forward and shooting with the bunker in front.

#### November 14: Training

Medics completed Physical Agility test. Officers practiced deploying distraction devices and making entries after. The garage at the old Armory was used for these exercises. Each SWAT officer deployed at least one distraction device.

Officers practiced officer down rescues in 12-53 in smoke conditions. The training was conducted in the parking lot of the old armory and the FD's smoke machine was used for this training. Smoke devices were also deployed.

Four officers practiced in tabletop logistical exercises. Enlarged photos of an overview of part of East Groveland were used. Officer(s) would be presented with an emergency call and they would explain where officers would respond to and how the call should be directed and coordinated.

Officers practiced shooting with the MP-5 in the following four training exercises:

- Standing behind a barricade
- Behind a free standing bunker
- Behind a bunker with a manikin behind it simulating shooting over an officer deploying a bunker
- Standing and shooting at a longer range target

#### November 14: Mutual aid for a barricaded subject

On November 14, 12 at approximately 2103 hours, the Shaker Hts. Police Department requested mutual aid assistance for the SWAT team for a barricaded subject with a mental health crisis at a residence. Initial report indicated that he was armed with a gun. SWAT team personnel and negotiators responded to that location. It was later learned that it was unknown whether he was armed.

Contact by phone was made with the male by Inv. Grisafio but he would not come out. Numerous efforts to communicate with him via phone or over the PA systems of the Beachwood and Shaker Hts. armored vehicles were unsuccessful to include attempts from his mother. At 0127 hours on November 15, SWAT personnel broke the front window of the home with a breaking tool and then deployed two CS gas rounds into two windows on the second floor in an effort to get him to come out of the home. He surrendered without incident at 0129 hours and was turned over to Shaker Hts. Police personnel. The Shaker Police Department was going to transport him to a hospital for a mental health evaluation through an application for emergency admission. Three windows were damaged.

#### December 12: Training

Sgt. Owens provided a Crisis negotiations training presentation which include a handout. Lt. Strazzo provided training on cold weather conditions, the use of a tourniquet and first aid materials from the IPOK. Officers practiced applying a tourniquet to themselves and/or the grappling mannequin.

Officers practiced hand strikes while wearing gas masks. They also practiced simulated control and handcuffing of a subject (grappling mannequin) while wearing gas masks. Officers practiced range training in two man teams using an MP-5 and the rolling bunker. They also worked behind the bunker in a larger group.

Officers participated in a range competition. The course started with 20 pushups and involved timed MP-5 shooting from behind a bunker and also a barricade.

December 18: Mutual aid for a barricaded subject

On December 18 at approximately 0956 hours, Ptl. Martin and Ptl. Kemer responded to a residence to assist the South Euclid Police Department with a barricaded person who was suicidal and believed to be in possession of a rifle. The S.E.P.D. initially requested two officers and then the armored vehicle. At approximately 1011 hours, they requested the department's full SWAT team and a page was sent.

As Ptl. Martin and Ptl. Kemer arrived in 12-53, the male surrendered to South Euclid Police Department personnel. The SWAT response was cancelled. Ptl. Kemer and Ptl. Martin assisted with other officers in clearing the home for any other persons inside.

December 27: Mutual aid for search of armed subject

The SWAT team was requested to assist the Orange Village Police Department in locating a male armed with a gun (later determined to be a BB gun) who had shot a female at the Courtyard Hotel and then fled in the area of the Fairfield Inn in Beachwood. The male was located by patrol officers prior to team involvement.

## **JAIL FACILITY**

In 2012, six hundred seventy two people were processed at the Beachwood City Jail. Forty four people were housed for a short period of time on a mutual aid basis. Eighty six people were processed as time servers. This brings the number of people arrested for crimes down to five hundred forty two. Thefts and related crimes account for the majority of arrests followed by outstanding warrants. One hundred twenty four juveniles were processed through juvenile booking. Theft was the leading charge for the year.

The vast majority of time servers were sentenced county prisoners, and the majority of those prisoner were moved to other facilities shortly after reporting to serve their sentence. County prisoners completing sentences in the Beachwood City Jail were typically three days or less. A concerted effort will be made to move all county prisoners to other facilities.

The Bureau of Adult Detention has implemented plans to re-initiate jail inspections throughout the state. A self-audit as well as jail statistics for 2011 was submitted to the bureau in October of 2012. It is anticipated that the jail will be inspected in 2013. Steps have been taken to ensure that the jail is in compliance with state standards and will pass inspection.

The primary stated goal for the Beachwood City Jail is to maintain a facility that is safe, secure, in good repair, and in compliance with state regulations. As noted above, the jail will be inspected in 2013. The jail was inspected in 2012 by the fire inspector and county health officials. The jail is inspected weekly by staff for security concerns and monthly for any health, safety and sanitation concerns. Any observed problems were addressed immediately. There were no major incidents reported in 2012. No staff members or inmates sustained injuries from incidents within the facility keeping us on track to achieve and maintain our stated goals.

We did see an increase in prisoners due to mutual aid housing. This will be monitored throughout the coming year to ensure the operations of the jail are not adversely affected.

# **COMMUNITY RELATIONS REPORT**

## **COMMUNITY RELATIONS / CRIME PREVENTION**

*THE MISSION FOR EVERY MEMBER OF THE BEACHWOOD POLICE DEPARTMENT IS TO CONSISTENTLY SEEK AND FIND WAYS TO AFFIRMATIVELY PROMOTE, PRESERVE AND DELIVER A FEELING OF SECURITY, SAFETY AND QUALITY SERVICES TO MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY.*

Effective and efficient community relations and crime prevention efforts play an important role in promoting, preserving and delivering a feeling of security, safety and quality services to those in the City of Beachwood. Efforts at preventing or controlling crime included preventive patrol, the investigation of suspicious or criminal activity and work involving community relations, community policing and crime prevention.

### **Concerns**

Complaints/Reports on traffic violations at different locations were a regular concern during the year. Uniform officers were advised to provide traffic details to address these complaints. Special emphasis was placed on school zones. Also, officers were encouraged to provide informational safety brochures to drivers involved in traffic stops. The safety of children while near or on a street is always a serious concern. Officers were advised to address the importance of wearing a bike helmet while riding a bike with children when they observe them riding without a helmet. Commander Mark Zuzek advised personnel about National School Bus Safety Week from October 22<sup>nd</sup> to the 26<sup>th</sup> and directed officers to provide traffic special attentions to schools zone and to monitor traffic when buses are making stops.

As addressed earlier, human trafficking was a serious threat and continued efforts to combat it are important particularly with the hotels within the city. The use of bath salts and "Spice"/incense is a problem as well as mobile meth labs that had been reported to have shown a significant increase in Summit County since 2010.

### **Services**

The department was active in 2012 in community relations and crime prevention efforts. Different officers provided such services as safety talks to children, bank procedure presentations, a senior and fraud scams talk at the Jewish Federation of Cleveland by Detective McFadden and the Senior Police Academy coordinated by Investigator Erin Draves.

The department provides a variety of programs such as Safety Town, e-Copp and home and business security surveys. The current programs and activities provided by our department can be useful and should continue.

## **Suggestions**

Foot patrols are a valuable community policing function that allows officers to interact well with those they serve. Officers on foot can be more approachable and allow for more citizen contacts which can promote harmony with those they serve. Officers are currently assigned to provide foot patrol to the Beachwood Place Mall on Friday and Saturdays in the afternoon and evening hours. It is recommended that officers continue to provide foot patrols at the mall as well as the city parks and other areas of concern. The use of foot patrol in a mall can help “promote, preserve and deliver a feeling of security” and safety for shoppers and visitors. The parks are an open area with lots of trees. Seeing an officer occasionally walking through can help make users of the park feel safe and comfortable and it can also be a deterrent for those considering criminal activity there. When other areas are a concern, officers can demonstrate a visible commitment through foot patrols.

Bike patrol is an important community policing function. In 2012, three more officers were trained on the use of a police bike. The use of more bike patrol is recommended.

The use of CPI cards are a valuable community relations/crime prevention tool that officers should utilize. Also, they should continue to be encouraged to provide safety literature when applicable and address children safety issues such bike helmet use requirements. During the course of patrol, officers can make citizen contacts which provide valuable opportunities to learn about what is going on in neighborhoods as well as provide insight to those we serve on how to stay safe and prevent crime.

## **CRIME PREVENTION TALKS**

Det. McFadden presented a one hour crime prevention talk to seniors at the Jewish Family Services facility on Science Park Drive, on August 1, 2012. About 50 seniors were in attendance for the talk. Home, internet, and phone scam protection was the topic discussed. Audience feedback was encouraged and public service brochures were provided to attendees.

## **THE SENIOR CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY**

The Senior Citizen Police Academy was conducted again in 2012 making this the 15th year the program has been in existence. Inv Erin Draves has taken over the directorship of the academy from Det Breckenridge. This year approximately thirteen seniors received crime prevention training and graduation certificates. There have been over two hundred and eighty resident graduates since its inception.

The Senior Citizen Academy is a crime prevention / informational program designed to meet the needs and interests of our senior citizens. It also gives the attendee an overview of how the

Beachwood Police Department accomplishes policing our community. The personal relationships that we have garnered through this program have been invaluable to this department and its members.

### **THE SELF-DEFENSE and AWARENESS PROGRAM**

The Police Department Self-Defense and Awareness Program is a community policing/crime prevention program that provides valuable self-defense and safety awareness training. It is presented by Beachwood police officers and is available to resident groups, civic organizations and corporations within the City of Beachwood. An instructor provided a block of self-defense and awareness training to members of the Senior Academy.

### **EDUCATIONAL CHILDREN ONLINE PROTECTION PROGRAM (E-COPP)**

The e-Copp program (Educational Children's Online Protection Program) is a community policing educational tool instructing children and adults on the dangers and proper uses of the Internet. The program is available for any interested group, organization, or individual. It is the goal of e-Copp to prevent Internet victimization through education. Children who experience e-Copp gain valuable insight into fun and productive uses of the Internet as well as those things about surfing online, email, chat rooms, and instant messaging that can present a danger to unsuspecting or naïve children. The children are provided handouts to share with their parents including a "Safe Surfing" contract that allows the child to positively interact with their parents regarding Internet issues in their home.

The Internet safety message is a relevant community policing tool available to any organization in Beachwood that requests our presentation. It is and has always been well received by the community. The Internet safety message fulfills the mission statement of the Beachwood police department as it truly and *"consistently seeks and finds ways to affirmatively promote, preserve, and deliver a feeling of security, safety, and quality services to members of our community"*.

### **INTERN REPORT**

During 2012, The Beachwood Police Department continued to work toward cultivating relations with high school and college aged students through the department's intern program. The goal of the program is to reach out to those students who are interested in the area of Law Enforcement and/or Criminal Justice to educate them about the kind of foundation that is necessary to succeed in this field.

The Beachwood Police Department accepted three completed applications for internships throughout the year and provided internship opportunities to two students during the course of 2012. There was one female intern and one male intern. The breakdown is as follows:

- One female was in a Sociology and Criminology program at John Carroll University
- One male was in the Criminal Justice Program and Basic Police Academy at The University of Akron

One female from Mayfield High School was unable to complete her Senior Project here as the department was preparing to offer a promotional examination for eligible current Beachwood Police Officers during the time of her program.

Based on scheduling and department work load, the interns may have had the opportunity to participate in or observe the following: police ride-along, dispatch operations, evidence processing, shooting range, court room to include both the Beachwood Mayor's Court and the Shaker Heights Municipal Court, internet programs/computer forensics, SWAT training, PR-24 training, AED/CPR/First Aid, OC Spray training, Defensive Tactics training, Taser training, and general office assistance.

Two of the male interns that we have accepted in our program returned in October 2012 to take part in the competitive entrance examination that was offered to hire new full-time police officers. Neither male scored high enough on the written exam to continue on through the hiring process.






# 2012 Assists – Disabled Vehicles







(by location)




# 2012 Assists – Mutual Aid Calls









(by location)






# 2012 Complaints –Noise Disturbance
























